THE Danger of Gasolene. "The principal danger from gasolene devices is in having the gasolene about. At ordinary temperature gasolene continually gives off inflammable vapor, and a light some distance from the material will ignite it through the medium of this vapor. The vapor from one pint of gasolene will make 200 cubic feet of air explosive. It depends upon the proportion of air and vapor whether it becomes a burning gas or destructive explosive. Beware of any leak in cans, and never forget how dangerous the material is in its handling."
