PROCEEDINGS OF PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE

(Continued from Page Two.)

In this Province, he must use methods of thought, methods that have proven, in short farming is a scientific occupation in every sense of the word. It calls for the careful study of the soil and for the full knowledge of animal and vegetable life. What is there in life's vocations that offers a greater field for study, for research and remunerative re-own than the tilling of the land? While great strides have been made for the better there is still much to be done. Opportunity is today knocking louder than ever at the farmer's door and he has an opportunity of nationalizing his product. To do so he must produce more, he must offer the best possible product. We are told again and again by the great statesmen who are charged with the responsibility of conducting the business of the Province, that it is of the utmost importance. Knowing full well that our farmers are ready and willing to co-operate I have great confidence in what is in store for us in this Province. I am strong of the opinion expressed by Capt. Reed of Summerside in a very interesting letter to the press a short time ago, when he ventured the opinion that, with the improved means of communication, which we will see inaugurated the coming Summer, our position regarding the world's great markets, land in this Province will multiply in value and the \$200.00 per acre he intimated is not too far distant. Great progress is being made in Agriculture, and this is due in no small matter to the businesslike administration of the Department of Agriculture under the present Government, to the liberal provincial financial assistance and to the Federal grant that the Government at Ottawa has placed at our disposal in the department of Mr. Reek, who has been directing agriculture work in this province, we have lost a very valuable official. Mr. Reek, during his stay on the island, had done a great deal to improve conditions in connection with agricultural education and his going away to another Province is to be regretted, but it is an appropriate fact that he has been called to a very responsible position in the Province of Ontario, and at a very much larger salary than he received here, and where remuneration to worthy officials will not be attacked and made a political football to serve small party ends.

FISHERIES.

The harvest of the sea has been, like that of the land, an abundant and profitable one. The prices, too, for the fisherman's harvest have been very high. The value of the fisheries for our Province have exceeded all previous records. There is a great heritage in the waters that wash our shores and it is encouraging to note that development and expert assistance is suggested to assist the fishermen so that even greater riches may be garnered from the deep. Help and education along this line will meet with general approval and will much encourage fishermen to exert their efforts.

CONCLUSION.

When we review conditions generally, not only in Prince Edward Island, but throughout the whole Dominion, we cannot but realize that great strides have been made along commercial lines. The trade balance of millions that only a very short time ago was against us has been turned to millions in our favor. This, in the face of the mighty conflict that has called the manhood so largely to arms depriving industry of very necessary labor, bespeaks volumes for what is in store, for our great Dominion when arms are laid down and peace is again proclaimed.

EDUCATION.

His Honor's reference to education is very assuring and it is very pleasing to note that more liberal supplements have been paid and equipment improved. From previous experience we can take it for granted that the Government has fully upheld, during the last year, its proud record of assistance to education. His Honor has paid a fitting tribute to the loyalty of so large a number of the male teaching profession who have responded to the call of their country. Among no other profession has the response been greater in proportion to their numbers. While education in the meantime is at a great loss, the inspiration given by the way of loyalty to duty will inculcate in the hearts and minds of the pupils of today a such one to do his share for the welfare of this Province.
