TEACHERS MEET AT YORK—The teachers from the surrounding districts of York met at York School for their second meeting on November 14. The meeting was brought to order by the president. The questions on the sheet were discussed briefly and the paper on Drawing read by four teachers. Some general questions were dealt with and helpful suggestions and ideas exchanged.

SEIZE BICYCLES—City Police yesterday seized 25 unlicensed bicycles at the various City Schools. The bikes were loaded on the City Truck and taken to the stations by one of the Constables. The seizure was made while classes were in progress at the three schools. All those without licenses were taken from their parking places outside.

SALVAGE WORK DELAYED — Unfavorable weather and rough seas this week have prevented the continuing of salvage operations to raise a Harvard training plane which sank in 30 feet of water about a mile off Point Prim over a week ago. The body of the pilot, Lieut. S. M. Levine, R.C.A.F., who was on a solo flight from Summerside Airport, has not been recovered. Divers were able to locate the wreckage, however, the day after the accident and the spot has been marked. Meanwhile the salvage crew awaits favorable conditions to start work again.

MISSING OVERSEAS — Sgt. James Irwin Henderson, R. C. A. F., Toronto, nephew of the late Mr. Archibald Irwin of this city, is "missing as a result of operations Nov. 11," according to word received by his father, Mr. Robert Pen-

LICENSES NEEDED — A telegram from Ottawa to J.P. Gordon Regional Director of Licensing under the Warlike Prices and Trade Board indicates that forty thousand licenses were mailed on Tuesday and Wednesday Nov 25th and 26th and that all applications received on or before Nov 22nd have been cleared up. About three hundred thousand licenses are required for Canada, about twelve hundred for Prince Edward Island. Applications should be made promptly as after December 1st merchants dealing in foods, feeds, livestock, poultry, yarn, cloth, clothing and footwear may not do business in their commodities unless licensed by the Warlike Prices and Trade Board.

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—(AP)—Henry R. Luce, editor of Time magazine, issued this statement tonight in commenting on President Roosevelt's attack on a Time magazine article about the late President Pedro Aguirre Cerda of Chile: "Time's sympathetic article on

the political difficulties and the health of the late president of Chile was based on a number of reports received from Time's correspondents. "Time realizes that the pressure of international politics may explain President Roosevelt's denunciation but believes that the President's words are unwarranted by the facts and unwise as an attack on a free and honest press. "Time has already received protests from Chilean officials but one had said anything in time's report was untrue until the President called it a 'disgusting lie'."
