NORTH HILL UNION, CALGARY

Urging women to co-operate in the establishment of a business enough, Donald McIntyre, recently from Glasgow, Scotland, speaking at a meeting of North Hill Union, said: "I had asked the women of Scotland and what message they would wish me to give the women of Canada. Death Of Dr. J. H. MacNeill At Kentucky

Dr. John Hardy MacNeill, 65, widely known retired Christian minister, died at 1.30 a. m. Monday (Jan. 10) at his home on South Main Street following a long illness.

Dr. MacNeill was born May 25, 1868 at Prince Edward Island, Canada, and was a son of the late John and Barbara MacNeill.

While young man, Dr. MacNeill began his ministerial career at the College of the Bible, Transylvania college, Lexington, upon completion of his ministerial course at that institution he held pastorates at Louisville, and at Rushville, Muncie and Kokomo, Ind., Norwood Ohio and Winchester and Shelbyville, Kentucky, respectively.

Dr. MacNeill came to Winchester in 1907 to serve as pastor of the First Baptist church, when that institution was located on the site of the present post office. Following the destruction of that building by fire, the present church structure at the corner of East Highman and South Highland Sts. was erected under the supervision of Dr. MacNeill, whom he served as pastor until 1922.

Dr. MacNeill's service as a Christian minister extended over a period of more than 50 years, 18 years of which were spent in Winchester, where he endeavored himself not only to the members of his congregation but the citizens of the community.

Upon leaving Winchester, Dr. MacNeill accepted a pastorate at Shelbyville from which he retired in 1936 and moved to Winchester where he has since resided with his daughter, Miss Josephine MacNeill.

During the period of his active ministry four church structures were erected under the supervision of Dr. MacNeill, namely Rushville and Kokomo, Ind., Norwood, Ohio, and the Winchester church.

He served as chairman of the board of curators of the College of the Bible, Lexington, for more than 30 years.

In 1898 Dr. MacNeill married Miss Virginia Croman, Cincinnati, Ohio, who died 10 years ago at Shelbyville.

Besides his daughter, Dr. MacNeill is survived by two sons, Homer C. MacNeill, Winchester and Frank A. MacNeill, Lima, Ohio; two grandchildren, Mrs. J. R. McIntosh, Winchester and John Franklin MacNeill, Cincinnati, O.; a brother, Roland H. MacNeill, Prince Edward Island, Canada, and several nieces and nephews, all of Canada.

Funeral services will be conducted at 10.30 a. m. Wednesday at the Joseph Apartments, South Main street, by Dr. Hugh McLellan, pastor of the First Christian church. Burial will be in the Hill cemetery, Louisville.

Brief services will be held at the cemetery by the Rev. Homer Carpenter, pastor of the First Christian church, Louisville.

Palbearers will be O. R. Webber, J. Smith Hays, Jr., Boswell B. Hogdkin, B. R. Joutet, J. C. Coe, and J. Q. Stewart. Honorary bearers will be the members of the First Christian church, Winchester, and members of the board of directors of the College of the Bible, Lexington.

The body will remain at the residence until the hour of the services.

A Life For The Church

The recent passing of Dr. John Hardy MacNeill is a distinct loss to a community which had looked to him for guidance and counsel for almost a half century.

The Rev. Dr. MacNeill came to Winchester shortly after the turn of the century, and with the exception of a few years, he spent the remainder of his noble life in our midst.

As a minister, he was a guiding power in the erection of the beautiful First Christian church on East Fickham street. In that church, in the homes of Winchester and with fellowman on the thoroughfares, he gave the word of God and served Christianity to the end.

The Rev. Dr. MacNeill died at the age of 85. He was a long life, a useful life—once devoted to the welfare of others.

HISTORY OF THE NAVAL REPAULETTES

Repaulettes were brought into the British Navy long after the Army had them, and after they were common in the French Fighting Forces. When first introduced, they were more or less a private adornment, and were shaped like a tassel. From their very start, repaulettes have been known as "Swabs."

We read that Lord Nelson, when at St. Omer in France, met Captain Ball and Shephard, who apparently wore repaulettes; for, he wrote a friend, concerning these two Naval officers— "They wore fine repaulettes, for which I think them great conceits. They have not visited me, and I shall not court their acquaintance." It is evident, from this, that the great Admiral did not think very highly of the practice of Naval Officers wearing elaborate uniforms.

It is also worthy of note that this fretful mood in Nelson's mind was revived some thirteen years later, when, in 1778, Captain Ball took over the command of the "Alexander" to join Nelson, he is credited with the words— "What! Have you come to have your bones broken?" However, apart from all this, it is gratifying to know that this opinion of Sir Alexander Ball underwent a somewhat drastic change in later years.

The main reason, it appears, for the introduction of repaulettes into the Royal Navy was, that foreign sentries did not accord the usual honors to British Naval Officers, as they did not recognize them as such without repaulettes.

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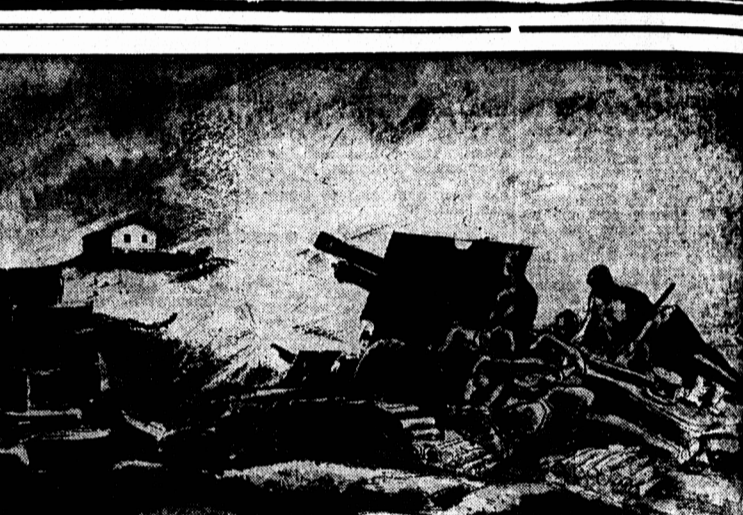
