VALUED AT \$75,000.—Saint Mary's Church which was destroyed by fire Sunday night last was valued at about \$75,000, the loss was covered partly by insurance. Little was saved from the conflagration. The cornerstone of this church was laid in 1902. The building was started by Rev. Father Donald Francis MacDonald and completed by Rev. Father Ronald B. MacDonald. It was of an artistic design architecturally and seated about nine hundred people.

I. O. D. E. MEETING.—There was a good attendance at the regular meeting of the Imperial Order of Daughters of the Empire last night. The Regent presided, and the secretary's report of the last meeting was read and adopted. Mrs. J. C. Houston was appointed convener of a committee for work in India, and \$10 was voted as a contribution to the Kaiser-i-Hind work in that country. By laws were passed defining the quorum for general meeting and for an executive meeting, also respecting the term of officers, the votes necessary for nomination, etc. A resolution was passed with respect to the condition of the Market Building and was forwarded to the Mayor and City Council for consideration at last night's Council meeting. Plans were made for the celebration of St. George's day, April 23rd, Mrs. J. A. Mathieson being appointed convener to make necessary arrangements. The committee appointed for the purpose reported with respect to the books for the library for children, and a sum of money was set aside to allow the committee to purchase suitable volumes. Members were asked to donate any books they had that would be suitable for children's reading. It was decided to take on the Rose Day sale, May 23rd, and all members will be asked to co-operate. A sum of money was set aside for the settlers' relief fund. The meeting adjourned until April.

Comments on N. B. Budget

The following comment appeared in an editorial in a recent issue of The Montreal Gazette.

"Actually, a better showing is made in the Hon. A. J. Ledger's budget statement in the New Brunswick Legislature than the Secretary-Treasurer of the province has ventured to predict. Last year was the first time in many sessions that a government had faced the Legislature with a real estimated surplus. On that occasion Mr. Leger, in his budget speech, forecast a revenue for the current fiscal year of \$5,110,439, and an expenditure of \$5,007,176, producing an estimated surplus of \$23,263. This year the Provincial Secretary-Treasurer finds himself in a position to report that the revenue has so far exceeded his anticipations that a surplus of \$197,161 is revealed. The exact figures are: Total revenue, \$5,785,619; expenditure, \$5,588,458. The estimated ordinary revenue for 1929 is \$6,009,694, which is \$224,071 more than last year's receipts and, if realized, it will be the first time in the history of the province that the budget has reported a revenue in excess of six million dollars. In contemplation of this larger income provision is made, naturally, for more generous expenditures.

"New Brunswick is expecting to attract new settlers, principally in the agricultural areas, and rightly, therefore a larger grant is to be voted to encourage immigration, and more money will be devoted to agricultural aids. Alert to the potentialities of the tourist traffic, Government assistance given to this service will be more liberal in 1929 than it was in 1928. Money thus spent, like the outlay on improving the roads, may be regarded as a good investment. Appropriations for education this year will set a new high level, being \$632,921 as compared with \$620,482 expended in 1928. It is likewise creditable to the Government that more acute efforts are to be made to advance the public health. Expenditure under the head is to be advanced from \$119,728 to \$146,340. Altogether, the Provincial Treasurer has allowed for an expenditure during the current fiscal year of \$5,985,475, which is a little more than \$397,000 greater than that of 1928, and leaves the possibility of a surplus of nearly \$25,000.

"Passed at the 1927 session of the Legislature, the act for the control of the sale of liquor in New Brunswick came into full effect in September of the same year, and in view of the fact that the net profits of the Liquor Control Board in 1928 were \$890,241, the Provincial Treasurer feels justified in anticipating from this source a revenue this year of \$1,200,000. If obtained, this will likely be the second largest single item in New Brunswick's revenue. The biggest lump sum hitherto acknowledged in the budget was \$1,265,766, being the 1928 subsidy and allowance from the Dominion Government. The experience in New Brunswick has not been unlike that of other provinces in the Dominion where the sale of liquor has been made subject to government control. Provincial finances have benefited; there has been more sobriety and respect for law and order; and a liberal measure of liquor profits which previously swelled the incomes of bootleggers is now available for public works and the betterment of education and other branches of the provincial administration. Economists in the United States have declared that, as a solution of the temperance question, the system of government control of the sale of liquors as practiced in Canada marks a definitely progressive step. In New Brunswick it appears to be giving general satisfaction. With the profit accruing from this system, and through prudent, economical and

Monthly Meeting of Summerside Town Council

The three new councillors Messrs L. M. MacNeill, L. A. Moore, and W. Kelly took their seats at the monthly meeting of the Summerside town council held last night, Mayor Lidstone presiding. After routine and the passing of bills amounting to \$3,600 the chief business of the meeting was the appointment of the town officials for the year and the standing committees. Mr. H. J. Massey and Mr. J. S. Wright were re-appointed town clerk and assistant respectively. Mr. T. H. S. Jackson reappointed engineer of the electric plant, Dr. E. T. Tanton reappointed health officer. Other existing officials were all reappointed with the following exceptions: New assessors appointed; Messrs C. C. Dickie and J. P. McInnis; first assistant engineer of electric plant, Anthony Arsepault; town teamster, James Gass; fire department chief, W. B. McNeill, assistant chief, Duncan Palmer.

The following standing committees for the year were named: Finance and purchasing—Councillor MacNeill, chairman, Councillor Schurman and Moore; streets, Councillor Phillips chairman, Councillor Grady and Moore. Police Councillor Moore, chairman, Councillors Schurman and Kelly. Light and power, Councillor Schurman, chairman, Councillors MacNeill and Kelly, Property and fire, Councillor Grady, chairman, Councillors MacNeill and Phillips. Schools and parks, Councillor Grady chairman, Councillor Moore and Schurman.

A motion was passed to the effect that all purchases must be by order signed by the chairman of the finance committee and the bills for same be presented at the end of each month. After reading a brief and satisfactory report of the engineer of the electric plant Councillor Schurman submitted a letter from Mr. Austin Scales, owner of the Dunk River Power Plant, calling attention to that river as a practical source of electric energy. Mr. Scales said he was willing to back up his faith in this source of energy by putting his own money behind it as he was confident that he could deliver current to the town limits of Summerside cheaper than it can be generated by the town plant.

Each councillor in turn spoke of the advisability of looking into Mr. Scales proposition and all agreed that any home proposition employing Island capital should be considered before proposals from any outside source. The communication was received and ordered to be answered with the invitation to Mr. Scales to place a detailed proposition before the council. Council adjourned to Monday next at 7.30 p. m.
