MAJOR W. POOLEY, a bright young man who resided in this town a few years ago, died last week in Denver, Col. of pulmonary trouble. His mother, Mr. Elizabeth Pooley and sister Mrs. Henry D. Shores of Winthrop street have resided here for some time. Mr. Pooley was born at Tryon P. E. I. twenty-three years ago, and attended the public schools there coming to this state he perfected himself in stenography and became an expert in that line. His first position was with the Parker, Holmes firm in Boston and later with the Draper Manufacturing Co. at Hopdale. Two years ago he obtained a situation as private secretary for B. F. Keith, the well known theatre proprietor, and went south with him on a yachting trip. On account of ill health young Pooley went to Denver last May and obtained a situation in the office of the General Electric Co. with Gen. Hale who had just returned from service in the Philippines. Deceased resided in this town for several years and made many friends in that short time. He was a member of the Hyde Park Bicycle Club and was greatly admired by his fellow members for his frank ways and manly character. He was a member of the Y. M. C. A. and the Y. M. C. W. in Boston. The remains were brought to this town and services were held at Henry D. Shores' residence on Winthrop Street Wednesday afternoon. Rev. George Callyer pastor of the Methodist Church officiated. Many relatives and friends were present including members of the former Hyde Park Bicycle club. There were numerous floral contributions from relatives and friends. The bearers were R. S. Pummer, C. F. Corbett, Howard McLean and Robert Forthysse. The remains were placed in the tomb at Fairview Cemetery, - Boston Exchange.

Mr. E. E. Pierce formerly of Summerside now living at Rosser, Manitoba, where he carries on a general mercantile business was again a sufferer by a cyclone which swept over that district on April 24th, during which also havoc was wrought, many barns were razed to the ground and several cattle were either disabled beyond recovery or killed and extensive damage done to property.

The Winnipeg Free Press in giving an account of the affair refers to Mr. Price's damage as follows: "Another heavy sufferer was the proprietor of the village store, Mr. E. E. Price.

"The entire front of the store was blown out and the contents of the window which consisted of a large consignment of straw hats were distributed promiscuously among the farmers of the surrounding country.

"The wind also wrought havoc among his stock of patent medicines, while papers were blown in all directions.

"The building itself was blown off its foundation and is in such a condition that Mr. Price in all likelihood will have to rebuild.

"Mr. Price in speaking of the cyclone said that it was the worst he had ever seen and he had been in several before.

"He was in his store about 6.30 o'clock when he was attracted by the ominous appearance of the clouds toward the southwest and also in the north. The sky was one black mass of clouds in both these directions and were whirled in circles by the wind. Mr. Price and some others who were in the store with him watched the clouds, for a few minutes when it was seen that the clouds from the north and those in the south were rushing together and naking for a point which would bring them almost over Rosser Station. The store which is a high building, having a hall over it for Church Services, did not seem to those watching the storm to be in a very secure place and Mr. Price hurried to his home about fifty feet away. From here he continued to watch the approaching storm. It was not many seconds before he could here the rush of wind which presently arose to a terrific howl.

"It was just 6.40 o'clock as it struck the town and the violence of the wind was so great that it looked as if the whole place would be wiped out of existence. The sound of the rushing wind was deafening. The timber pile outside of the house was blown down and the boards and scantlings, not carried away by the wind, were driven end ways into the ground. The chimneys in the houses were swept off as if made
