practice of his profession at Alberton, where he remained until 1896, and then came to Tignish where he permanently located. He was well grounded in the knowledge of medicine and surgery, and gained a widespread reputation as a thorough, competent and trustworthy physician.

The deceased, like his father before him was a Conservative. He took an active part in political life, being for a time President of the West Prince Liberal-Conservative Association. He was an unsuccessful candidate for Prince County in the general election of 1911, and on the death of Senator A. A. Macdonald was appointed to the Senate of Canada in November, 1912.

He was also engaged in business in Tignish, being President of the Tignish Trading Company for a number of years, and took a most prominent part in all measures tending to advance the interest of the community.

Although he was a strong Conservative he had many warm friends in both parties. He was a vigorous and effective platform speaker, was thoroughly versed on public questions and did his best to uphold the interests of this Province in Parliament.

He was a member of the Catholic Mutual Benefit Association, a charter member of the Knights of Columbus and a member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians.

He was a valued member of the Prince Edward Island Medical Society, and President of the Maritime Medical Association in 1905 and 1907.

He was thrice married. His first wife was Miss Mianie M. Burke, of Georgetown, a sister of Reverend Dr. A. E. Burke; his second wife, Miss Agnes Wickham of Tignish and his third wife, who survives him, was a Miss Evelyn Clarke from Ottawa. At present she is at the Capital, having gone there to attend the funeral of her brother, Colonel Clarke.

Senator Murphy, leaves to mourn besides his widow five sons and two daughters. The sons are Alfred E. B., of Edmonton; Claude of Winnipeg; Howlan of Montreal; and Maxwell, a law student at St. Paul, Minn; and Reginald at home.

The daughters are Eleanor and Nellie, also of Tignish. These three had intended to accompany their father to Ottawa.

Two brothers, Jeremiah at Putnam, Conn; Fred in California and one sister, Margaret, wife of Mr. Kaling, Superintendent of the New England Telephone Company also survive him.

The funeral notice will be published later.

**Farmers Institute Meeting**

At the closing meeting of the Central Farmers' Institute yesterday morning, at which the President Mr. W. M. Hayter, Murray River, occupied the chair, the financial report of the Institute was read by the Secretary, Mr. Chas. McKenzie. It showed a balance on hand of \$46.25.

The President's report was read clause by clause, and discussed by Messrs. R. A. Prof. Brodie, Bruce Butler, Daniel Stewart, Mr. McSwain, Prof. Clarke and others.

The following resolutions were presented:

Whereas several branches of our Island Railways remain undisturbed, causing delay and serious loss to shippers of live stock and perishable products;

And whereas farmers wishing to purchase fertilizer, crushed lime, stone, etc., are unable to do so without having some barged, hence which greatly enhances the cost of use, which means less production, consequently less business for our railways;

Resolved that we, the members of the Central Farmers' Institute here assembled, strongly urge upon our Federal Government the necessity of standardizing the remainder of our railways at the earliest possible date.

Moved by W. D. Butler, seconded by Alex. E. Richards, found that he was supplied with data and was doing his best to secure this measure for us. He felt that at the present time expenditure of a large sum of money to procure the accredited herd system P. E. Island as a disease free area in this province; and whereas the tested herds are continually coming in contact with diseased herds; and whereas this province on account of its location is especially adapted for the diseased free area plan;

Resolved that we, the Central Farmers' Institute, urge the Federal Government to adopt this diseased free area plan as soon as possible.

Moved by R. A. Profitt, seconded by Peter Brodie, found that the cooperative system of marketing of farm products is fast coming into favor, and whereas the chief difficulty in connection with the successful carrying out of this co-operative system of marketing is the lack of experience of the average farmer in the art of salesmanship and his lack of opportunity of keeping in contact with market conditions;

Resolved that the members of the Central Farmers' Institute express their thanks to the citizens of Charlottetown and especially the Rotary Club for pleasant week's entertainment.

exhibit at the Royal Show; our first year's experience taught us to leave some animals at home. We profited by this teaching and at the last Royal we made a co-operate exhibit from the Club, the success of which I think warrants its continuance. At this show members made some very creditable wins.

At the time of Charlottetown Exhibition we asked financial aid from the Department of Agriculture in making this shipment of Show Heifer Club boys to the Royal as help in caring for the stock. I wish to thank the Department for its assistance in this instance.

The policy of tuberculin testing, which has been one of the strongest in the foundation of the Club, has not been forgotten during the past year. At the last Annual Meeting the question of a tuberculin free area for the Province was discussed and resolutions were passed favoring it. Since that time the idea has been carried further, this Club opened the way for discussion, rival breed organizations have at last made similar moves.

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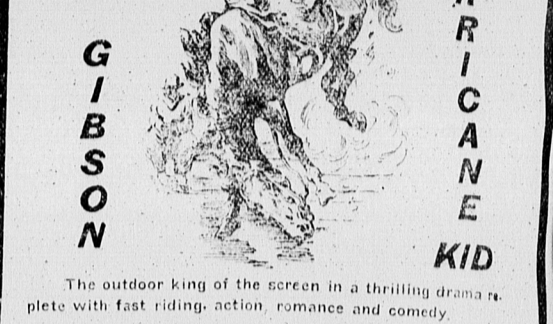

A motion was passed that the Provincial Exhibition be asked to adopt the same standard for bulls as used at the Royal Fair, this to apply in 1926.

**THE MARKETS**

(Canadian Press)  
OTTAWA, March 6.—(EGGS)—Receipts are reported to be much heavier and the tone of the market is easier. The supply at Alberta points is reported to be sufficient to meet the consumptive demand. Reports from the Maritime Provinces also point to much heavier receipts.

Toronto jobbing specials 42, extras 40, firsts 37, seconds 34. Montreal dealers are paying delivered extras 35 to 36, firsts 30 to 32.

United States fresh firsts jobbing 38, seconds 35, Manitoba and Saskatchewan markets unchanged. Calgary receipts are heavier with dealers paying delivered extras 35, firsts 30, seconds 20. Vancouver dealers are paying delivered extras 31, firsts 29, jobbing extras 36, firsts 23, seconds 20.

MONTREAL, March 6.—Extreme dullness marked the export trade in Canadian grain here today. The only business reported was an odd lot of barley and oats for shipment. Prices for oats were reduced another cent per bushel with Ontario No 3 grade quoted at 63 cents and No 4 grade at 61 cents per bushel-extors.

Owing to the weakness in Canadian cash wheat at Winnipeg the local flour market for spring wheat was again weak and prices were reduced another 30 cents per barrel which makes a net reduction of 60 cents per barrel for the present month to date. Winter wheat flour was also reduced ten cents per barrel. A moderate amount of business was transacted in millfeed and the tendency was steady. The demand for rolled oats was quiet.

The weakness in the local egg situation on Thursday was more pronounced today and local wholesale jobbers reduced prices a further two cents per dozen. This was attributed to increased offerings of Canadian stock and the liberal supplies of American eggs coming forward. An easier feeling developed in butter and prices were unchanged. The trade in cheese was inactive and prices were unchanged with folder made No 1 white and colored goods quoted at 25 1/4 and 25 1/2.

EDMONTON, March 6.—Unimpaired farmers of the Villa district in Alberta are beginning to weaken under the "antonomy" to "land-blessedness". At any rate a group of back-slash farmers, with the assistance of the Villa citizens' league, have commissioned T. M. Jackson, of Pine Knoll, to visit England and Ireland this summer and bring back with him women of marriageable age that would make suitable life partners for the Villa homesteaders. The U. F. A. locals have endorsed the idea and
