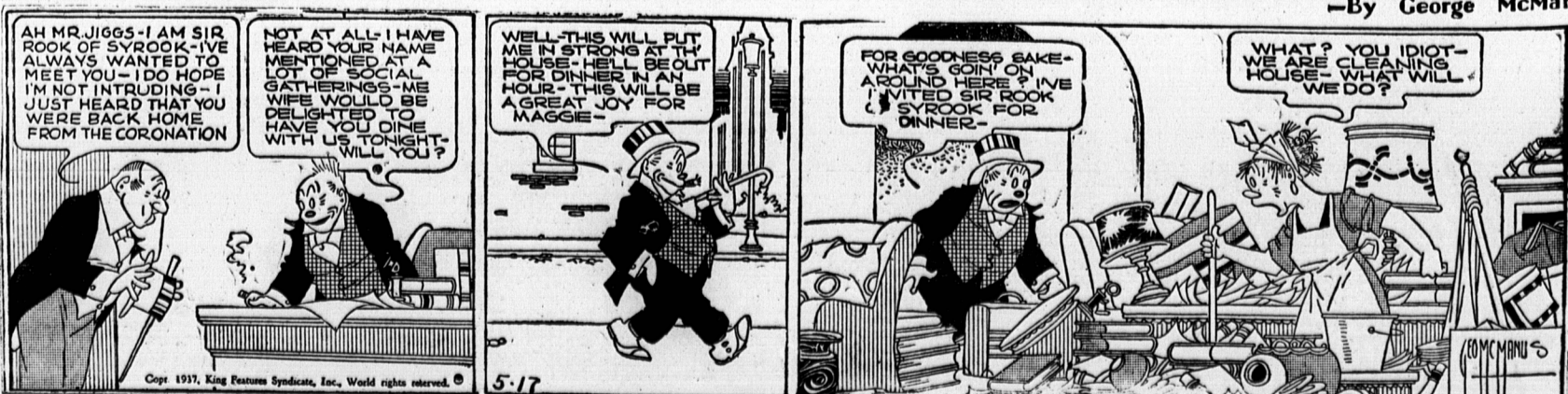

Settlement Reached In Steel Strike

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) PITTSBURGH, May 14—Thousands of cheering workers paraded back to the Jones and Laughlin Steel Corporation mills today, ending the greatest walk out in the past 18 years of steel history in the United States.

A tentative peace agreement was reached between Chairman Philip Murray of the steel workers organizing committee and H. E. Lewis, chairman of the Corporation's Board of Directors. It provided for immediate resumption of operations at the strike-affected plants in Pittsburgh and Aliquippa, Pa., returned 27,000 workers to their jobs without discrimination and cleared the way for an election to determine the union's claim to exclusive collective bargaining rights.

Students Are Touchy About Publicity

LONDON, May 15—Oxford and Cambridge University rowing club presidents have appealed to the press for a little more respect and much less fanfare.

In a joint letter they say, in effect, that the famous boat race should not be endowed with the weller of comment associated with other great sporting events, and that it is a piece of impertinence for sports writers to write their advance criticism in the tone of open suggestions to the respective coaches.

The letter, written to The Times acknowledges with thanks the honor accorded the race in the way of public interest but protests against "certain forms of publicity." These include "private interviews, at home photographs" and other "invidious" types of publicity.

Jack Lewis, Oxford president and M. P. Lonnon, Cambridge president, express the hope that such intrusions in the future will be highly deprecated by the public as not becoming the privacy "to which as true amateurs we are entitled."

"But this is not all," continues the letter, for some of the best-intentioned of both race critics have come to regard themselves in the light of supplementary coaches, and of therefore writing to or at the crews rather than for the public—to think to influence the policy of the president or coaches, or to improve the rowing of the men by means of articles in the papers is not merely tactless, it is highly impertinent."

The presidents also regretted the partiality of the press this year to Oxford as "painful to endure" so that the public "cannot hope ever to get an impartial judgment of the worth of either (crew) and the training of both crews is made doubly difficult by the effect of this partiality on the mental state of the men in the boats."

Birthday Is Just Another Day To Louis

KENOSHA, Wis., May 13—(AP)—Joe Louis was 23 today, but instead of celebrating by feasting and lolling, he did 10 miles of roadwork and called for sparring mates.

Arrangements had been made for a turkey dinner, with a cake and candies as a table centre piece, but the Brown Bomber called a halt at the last minute.

Explaining he was late in getting started, Louis said he wanted no interruptions in his program of preparation for his world heavyweight boxing title bout with champion James Braddock in Chicago June 22.

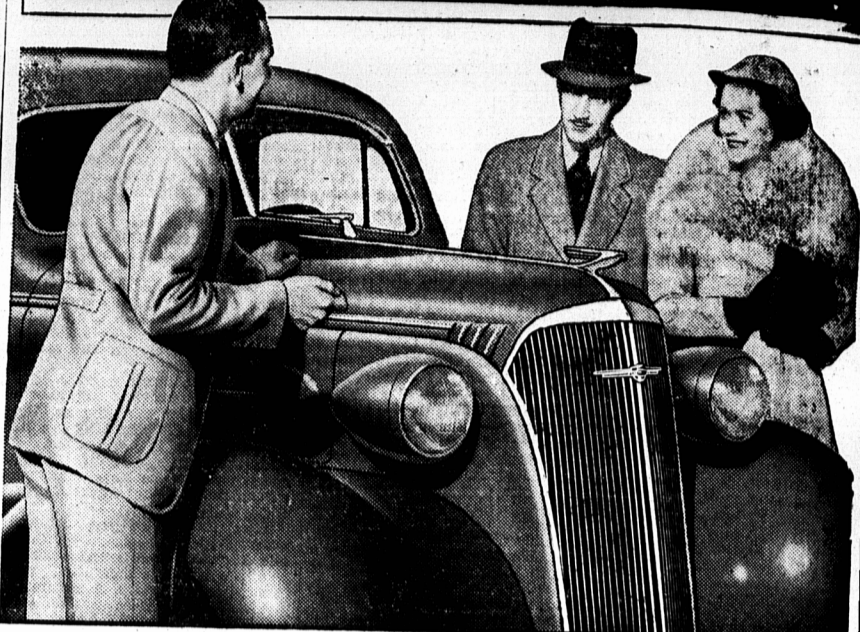

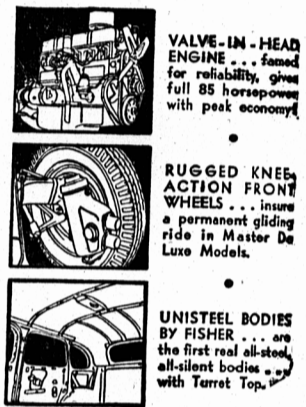
