RAGES AGAINST PEACE PROGRAM

Ben Tillett Attacks Mr. Carnegie—Attitude Extremely Hostile.

LONDON, May 6 (Special)—An extremely hostile attitude toward the British delegation now on the voyage to the United States to arrange the program for the celebration of the Anglo-American Peace Centenary has been taken up by a section of British workmen, at the head of which is Ben Tillett, secretary of the Dock, Wharf, Riverside and General Workers' Union of Great Britain and Ireland.

An appeal was sent by cable on their behalf today to Samuel Gompers, president of the American Federation of Labor, in the following words: "British workers appeal to the American trades unions not to mask the Carnegie peace delegates' mission to America. They hope America will not support the suggestion that he should assist England in making war against Germany."

SUDDEN DEATH OF AGED AMHERST COUPLE.

AMHERST, May 4.—Death came with suddenness to Mr. and Mrs. James Duxbury, two of Amherst's oldest and most respected citizens. On Thursday Mrs. Duxbury was taken ill but no thought of death entered the minds of those in attendance. Friday night at 11 o'clock she suddenly passed away. Her husband who had been about his work during the day was taken ill and at eight o'clock on Saturday he also passed away. The double funeral took place today, the burying being at the old burying ground, West Amherst, the two hears being followed by an unusual large crowd.

IRRESPONSIBLE LUNATICS NOW

LONDON, May 5.—Willoughby Dickenson in moving the second reading of the women's suffrage bill in the Commons this afternoon argued that to refuse women the right to vote in order to punish a few criminals such as the members of the women's social political union would be unjust. Arthur Cecil Beek and another Liberal member, speaking for the rejection of the bill, claimed that the fact that all the outrages and crimes committed by women of education and high character showed conclusively that such women among the voters would be an absolutely destructive blow at parliamentary and constitutional government.

The abstention of speakers of prominence from the debate caused interest to lag to such an extent that at one time there was less than a quorum present. All the speakers, whether in support or opposition to suffrage were opposed to militancy. Viscount Walter speaking on behalf of the bill evoked cheers by his condemnation of "those irresponsible lunatics who are carrying on the militant movement." The Right Hon. Charles Wortley, another supporter of the bill, said "No sane man can approve of the criminal acts of the militant group."

IN MEMORIAM

James R. Pound was born at Fredericton, Prince Edward's Island fifty-six years ago and died of pneumonia following a brief illness April 8, 1913. At the age of twenty-two he went to Audubon, Iowa, and engaged in the carriage building business until six years ago when he moved to Oklahoma on account of poor health. For the past two years he has been employed at the Buick Co. No. 11 in Flint. His first wife, Thomas' second wife, was Miss Margaret Baker of Flint township, died thirteen years ago at Audubon, Iowa, and his wife, who was Miss Fatima Baker of Audubon, Iowa died two years ago at Kingfisher, Oklahoma. The love and esteem in which he was held by all who knew him was shown by the many floral tributes which were sent from friends in Audubon, Kingfisher, Flint and Clio. The funeral was held April 11, at Flint. Interment was made at Clio, the Vienna Lodge F. & A. M. having charge of the burial service. He is survived by four children: Mrs. Kendall Morton, Kingfisher, Oklahoma; Paul Pound of Flint and Naomi and Beulah Pound of Clio, also by five brothers and one sister, Thomas Pound of Benton, John Pound of Clio, Samuel Pound of Fredericton, P. E. I., Mark Pound of Elliotts Station, P. E. I., Isaac Pound of Boston, and Mrs. Otis Searly of Flint. Rev. E. C. Benson officiated. Mr. Pound was well known in Prince County having worked with Mr. James Tuplin of New Annan for a number of years. His many friends will regret to hear of his death.—Summerside Pioneer please copy.

ST. LOUIS MAN KILLED HIS WIFE AT DINNER PARTY

ST. LOUIS, Mo., May 5.—While seated at a dinner party in the midst of a merry crowd, including her daughter, Mrs. Emma Hoehn was shot and killed at her home, 1432 North Jefferson Ave., Saturday by her husband, who was enraged because she had spurned his efforts at reconciliation. He fired over the heads of her guests. They had been separated six months. He fired four bullets at her, one taking effect in her left breast, one in her right shoulder and the fourth in her left leg. Death was instantaneous.

STEAMER GLACE BAY IS A TOTAL LOSS NEAR CAPE RACE

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., May 4.—The British freight steamer Glace Bay went ashore in a fog near Cape Race yesterday and will probably be a total loss. Captain Plumb and the entire crew of 44 men landed safely in the cliffs. The Glace Bay was in ballast on her way from Sydney, C. B., to Wabana, Nfld. She was used principally as an ore carrier. Her tonnage was 3,380.
