RELATIVE VALUES.

A paragraph going the rounds of the press makes a comparison between the salary to be received by President Taft as Professor of Law at Yale University, on his retirement from the Presidency of the United States, and that now received by certain Mr. Jones as coach of a football team. President Taft will receive \$5,000 to teach some thousands of young men the principles of law in one of the greatest universities of the world; Mr. Jones will receive \$4,000 to teach several boys how to play football. And, compared with many other positions in the world of sport, Mr. Jones is evidently but a novice as baseball and hockey clubs pay much higher salaries than his to their experts.

In each case the salary is based on its actual commercial value. The university no doubt pays its professor a legitimate proportion of what he earns. If he possesses the qualities which will draw students to the university he earns the maximum that a professor is worth. If, on the other hand, his methods are such as will tend to empty the college he is "sacked," just as any other employee would be under similar circumstances. And so with the football, the baseball, the hockey expert. If he, by the brilliancy of his playing, attracts crowds to the performances or enables those whom he is coaching to do so, he is worth his salary. The value placed upon the expert footballist and the expert professor of law is purely commercial. There is no question as to the relative mor-

THE FISHERMEN

A correspondent from the neighborhood of Richmond Bay complains that the proposed development of the oyster industry is going to work incalculable injury to the fishermen. His argument, briefly, is that the leasing to capitalists of large areas from which fishermen have, for several generations, secured a living is an injustice to the fishermen, that the latter will receive no benefit from the expected development and that, in consequence, they will be obliged to leave their native province.

We have just had the privilege of examining the plans of Richmond Bay, prepared by Professor Shaw and, as far as we can see, no privilege heretofore enjoyed by the fishermen has been taken away. Anything that looked like a live bed, wherever live oysters were found, wherever oyster fishing has been carried on and even where dead oyster reefs exist—even although no life has been found—has been reserved. The area of the whole bay is 30,000 acres; the area laid off for leasing is 14,700 acres, the balance of 15,300 or considerably more than half the total area has been reserved for the fishermen. Not only this but wherever a complaint has been made against the leasing of any area because of the existence of live oysters, no leases are granted until there has been further and more complete examination. The areas adjoining live oyster beds are also reserved for the fishermen.

In the plan of the section lying between Curtain Island and Malpeque wharf, although no beds of live oysters were found by the surveyors, quite a number of reservations have been laid off. The section from Curtain Island to Locke's Shore is practically all reserved with the exception of small areas along the latter shore.

MILITARY TRAINING.

LONDON, Feb. 22—Twelve eminent Professors of Cambridge have launched a remarkable proposal to promote military training. It is said that no undergraduates will be given degrees until they are efficient as members of the Officers Training Corps or the Territorial Force. They will seek Oxford's Co-operation and suggest an extension scheme to the Civil Service and Municipal Railway Employment promotion.

KNOLLYS TO RESIGN.

LONDON, Feb. 22—Lord Knollys is to resign as Secretary to King George V. He has been an officer of the Royal Household for 45 years.

MONTENEGRO WILL NOT YIELD.

LONDON, Feb. 20—The story of a three-days battle at Bulair in which 3,500 men on each side were reported killed or wounded, contained in a despatch received here today, is now believed to be a revival of an old report of fighting in that district. Rumors that Enver Bey had landed a large force at Rodost were current on Feb. 16, but since have been denied. An uncensored Constantinople despatch says that Schefket Pasha visited the Bulair lines Wednesday, but has given no indication that a new battle had been fought.

The situation at Adrianople remains unchanged. The porte have refused to permit foreigners to leave Adrianople. The governor of the fortress has offered to set apart the Karagatch quarter of the right bank of the Maritza River as a sanctuary for the 1,400 foreign residents. It is doubtful, however, if Bulgaria will consent to this.

The Servians have brought up heavy artillery to assist the Montenegrins in a renewed attack on Scutari. M. Popovitch, the Montenegrin delegate in London, visited the foreign office today and informed the British government that under no circumstances could Montenegro acquiesce in any transaction under which she would be required to abandon her claim to Scutari. He added that Montenegro would take the town soon, and after the sacrifices made would suffer annihilation rather than give it up.

A semi-official statement issued at St. Petersburg says that Bulgaria and Roumania have already accepted the mediation of the powers.

GIANT BLAST ON G. T. P.

PRINCE RUPERT, B. C., Feb. 10—On the shores of Burns Lake, for nearly a week coyote holes for the largest blast ever used on the Grand Trunk Pacific are being charged with powder. Today it is expected the blast will be set off. More than fifty tons of black powder and five tons of dynamite are being used.
