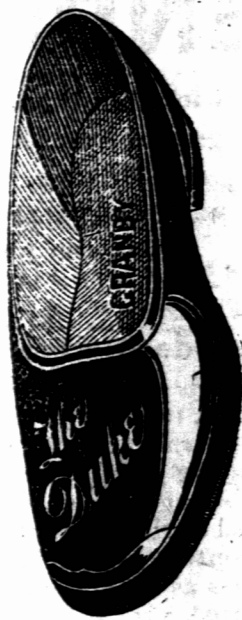

Thirty-two Thousand are Affected in New England

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ACQUITTED OF BLACKMAIL CHARGE

Constable Brown Discharged Yesterday Afternoon

By Stipendiary Palmer—Isaac Brown, Plaintiff, Arrested and Sent Down to Jail on Commitment.

For the second time during the past week the prosecution of the liquor men against the assistants of those engaged in the suppression of the traffic and the enforcement of the Prohibitory Law has ignominiously failed.

The case yesterday was for blackmail brought at the instance of Isaac Brown, a well known violator of the Scott Act at Cherry Valley who was represented by A. J. B. Mellish; and the accused was Walter R. Brown, Constable for Queen County.

The hearing of the case took place in the Supreme Court room before Stipendiary Magistrate Palmer and occupied all of yesterday afternoon. The defendant was represented by F. L. Hassard, K. C.

The first witness offered by Mr. Mellish was Isaac Brown, the prosecutor. In this case, Brown said that Walter Brown, the defendant, had offered to get him clear of a Scott Act case for ten dollars and John McKenzie clear for twenty dollars. Other witnesses examined were Sheriff McDougall, Dr. J. A. C. Rogerson Vernon River Bridge, Simon Brown, John McKenzie and Mrs. McKenzie, Vernon River Bridge.

The case was then closed for the prosecution. No witnesses were offered for the defence.

Mr. Hassard argued that even if the charges made by the prosecution were true, which he contended were not, there would be no case of blackmail. There was only an offer to assist offenders to get clear from prosecutions, there was no threat. Mr. Mellish followed asking that Brown be sent up to the Supreme Court.

The magistrate in giving judgment said the evidence of Brown the plaintiff was not corroborated by the other witnesses in the material points and he could not hold it was sufficient to send the prisoner up for trial. With regard to the question raised by Mr. Hassard as to the offer to clear Brown and McKenzie not being blackmail, he would not at the present moment give an opinion, as in his mind the evidence was insufficient to send the prisoner Walter Brown up for trial. He consequently discharged him from the charge of blackmail.

During the progress of the trial Isaac Brown, who had been seated beside his counsel, Mr. Mellish, left the court room for a moment. Outside the door he was served with a commitment by Constable Dover and was taken down to jail to serve his sentence for the conviction obtained against him for breach of the Scott Act several days ago.
