Alberta Faces Seed Shortage

CALGARY, Dec. 10.—Alberta faces probably the most critical seed shortage in its history. G. M. Stewart, chief of the Calgary office of the Dominion Seed Branch, said today. Oats and barley seed supplies were particularly scarce, he said. Mr. Stewart estimated the situation was the most serious in his 20 years' experience and inferior seed would have to be sown in some instances unless good seed was imported from other provinces.

Smaller Powers Reported Opposed To Original Pact

Revised Scheme Forwarded To Rome And Addis Ababa As Basis For Settlement Of Conflict.

OTTAWA, Dec. 10.—Dominion-wide registration of unemployed persons seeking work was tentatively approved at this afternoon's session of the Dominion-Provincial conference committee on unemployment and social services. A sub-committee of conference technical advisers was appointed, under the chairmanship of Dominion statistician R. H. Coats, to inquire into ways and means of carrying out this work.

General agreement was also reached upon the desirability of establishing a system of mining taxation which would fix such taxes at a level for a period tentatively set at five years. This subject was studied at the first meeting of the committee on mining and taxation which is headed by Hon. T. A. Creer, Minister of Mines.

Under the chairmanship of Hon. Norman McL. Rogers, Minister of Labor, the committee on unemployment and social services held its second meeting this afternoon and will meet again tomorrow afternoon. In addition to the appointment of a sub-committee on the registration of willing workers, the committee went into the question of relief camp projects and division of relief costs.

Major General E. C. Ashton, chief of the general staff, Department of National Defence, was called in to address the committee on relief camps which are to be transferred from the jurisdiction of that department to labor. These camps, maintained for transient unemployed men, were the subject of considerable discussions during the past year, resulting from some discontent that arose among those who lived in them last summer.

Smaller Powers Reported Opposed To Original Pact

Revised Scheme Forwarded To Rome And Addis Ababa As Basis For Settlement Of Conflict.

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) A revised Anglo-French plan to halt Italy's campaign in Ethiopia was dispatched from Paris to Addis Ababa and Rome last night. The plan, originally drafted over the weekend by Premier Laval and Sir Samuel Hoare, British Foreign Secretary, was understood to have been revised yesterday by the British Cabinet.

It was reported in Paris M. Laval had been advised from Rome there was "every chance" Il Duce would accept the plan as a basis for negotiations and that the French Premier would urge postponement of the League sanctions committee meeting scheduled for Thursday to consider an oil embargo against Italy.

INFORMED LONDON QUARTERS ALSO PREDICTED Il DUCE WOULD ACCEPT THE PLAN, ALTHOUGH HAVAS LEARNED ON GOOD AUTHORITY THAT EMPEROR HAILE SELASSIE HAD DISPATCHED A NOTE TO THE BRITISH GOVERNMENT, REJECTING IT.

REPORTS THAT ANTHONY EDEN, BRITISH MINISTER FOR LEAGUE AFFAIRS, WOULD RESIGN IN PROTEST AT THE TERMS OF THE PLAN, WERE DENIED AND EDEN HIMSELF HELPED DISPEL THE RUMOR BY DEFENDING THE PLAN IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

THE SMALLER POWERS AT GENEVA, HOWEVER, WERE REPORTED IN VIRTUAL REVOLT AGAINST THE ORIGINAL PEACE SCHEME, CALLING IT APPROVAL OF ITALIAN AGGRESSION AND VIOLATION OF THE LEAGUE COVENANT.

AN AUTHORITATIVE SOURCE IN PARIS SAID THE PEACE PLAN PROVIDED ITALY SHOULD GET TIGRE PROVINCE, EXCEPTING AKSUM, AND MUCH SOUTHEASTERN TERRITORY; AND ITALIAN-SPONSORED COLONIZATION VENTURE IN ETHIOPIA WOULD BE ENTERED AND THE LEAGUE WOULD GIVE ADMINISTRATIVE AND FINANCIAL AID TO ETHIOPIA.

COMMUNIQUE IN BOTH ROME AND ADDIS ABABA CLAIMED VICTORIES IN MINOR ENGAGEMENTS ON THE NORTHERN FRONT.

GENEVA, Dec. 10.—The League of Nations was threatened tonight with a crisis over the opposition of smaller powers to the reported African peace plan drafted by Great Britain and France.

If newspaper reports of the peace plan are correct, some delegates said, a most serious situation would develop with even resignations of certain nations possible.

The situation was described as a virtual rebellion.

Representatives of smaller powers said that if the reported peace plan was put through it would result in the League having given Italy a "premium for aggression."

(Newspaper accounts state under the peace plan Italy would be given considerable areas of Ethiopia and Ethiopia a port by Italy.)

Referring to financial losses incurred by nations which are enforcing sanctions against Italy, one delegate asked: "Why should we lose money to facilitate a big power deal?"

Delegate's View

Another delegate said his country approved sanctions to prevent Italian aggression against Ethiopia and to establish a precedent for future collective security against war.

The rebellion of smaller powers seemed to be taking form in the following concrete program:

1. That the League committee of 18 on sanctions should not postpone fixing a date for the addition of oil to articles banned to Italy.

2. An Armistice is a necessary accompaniment to any Italo-Ethiopian peace negotiations.

3. The League council should be given the opportunity to weigh Franco-British peace proposals.

Next Move By Hauptmann Defence Remains In Doubt

TRENTON, N. J., Dec. 10.—The next move Bruno Richard Hauptmann's attorneys will make to save him from the electric chair for the Lindbergh murder remained a matter of doubt today and Hauptmann himself, his wife said, was uncertain what it would be.

Mrs. Hauptmann and Lloyd Fisher, one of Hauptmann's lawyers, visited the condemned man in the death house of State Prison. They said they found him cheerful and confident in spite of the shock caused by the refusal of the United States Supreme Court to review his Flammington trial.

"He's just the same as ever," Mrs. Hauptmann said. "He hasn't lost courage. Most of our talk was about the baby and he asked for more pictures of him."

Fisher and Egbert Rosencrans may ask for a new trial on the basis of what they call newly discovered evidence, or they may appeal directly to the Court of Pardons for clemency. This court, composed of Governor Harold Hoffman, Chancellor Luther Campbell, highest judicial officer in the State, and six lay judges of the Court of Errors and Appeals, may act on the case, however, of its own volition.

It is Governor Hoffman's interest in the case, as well as the expressed conviction of Ellis Parker, Burlington County detective chief, that Hauptmann is innocent, that has heartened the defence.
