ANNUAL CHURCH MEETING. The annual meeting of St. Andrew's church, Montague, P.E.I., was held on Wednesday, the 17th January, at 7.30 p.m. The Rev. David Wright, minister in the chair. Alex. McLean was appointed secretary. The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and approved. The reports of the various organizations were given, and all showed progress. The general treasurer's report was, however, the center of expectation. For a good number of years the congregation has been struggling and handicapped with a considerable debt. This has been reduced, and the congregation began the year 1916 with a debt of six hundred and nineteen dollars. It was felt that this ought to be wiped out. The Trustees and Treasurer expressed a wish that the congregation be free of debt. The various organizations and the different sections of the congregation rallied to the help of the Trustees with the result that the Treasurer, Mr. John Fraser, was able to present the best financial report in the congregation's history. The annual revenue of this church has fluctuated between thirteen hundred and fifty dollars to fourteen hundred dollars. During the past year the congregation raised over twenty-three hundred dollars beside presenting the minister, Rev. D. Wright, with a handsome racoon coat costing one hundred and twenty-five dollars. In a word, the congregation raised nearly one thousand dollars more than the usual annual revenue. Their contributions to the various missionary and other enterprises of the church were higher than any previous year, and all this exclusive of their contributions to the Red Cross, Belgian Relief, Patriotic, and other funds. The minister, the session, trustees, the treasurer, and the congregation are to be congratulated on their splendid showing.

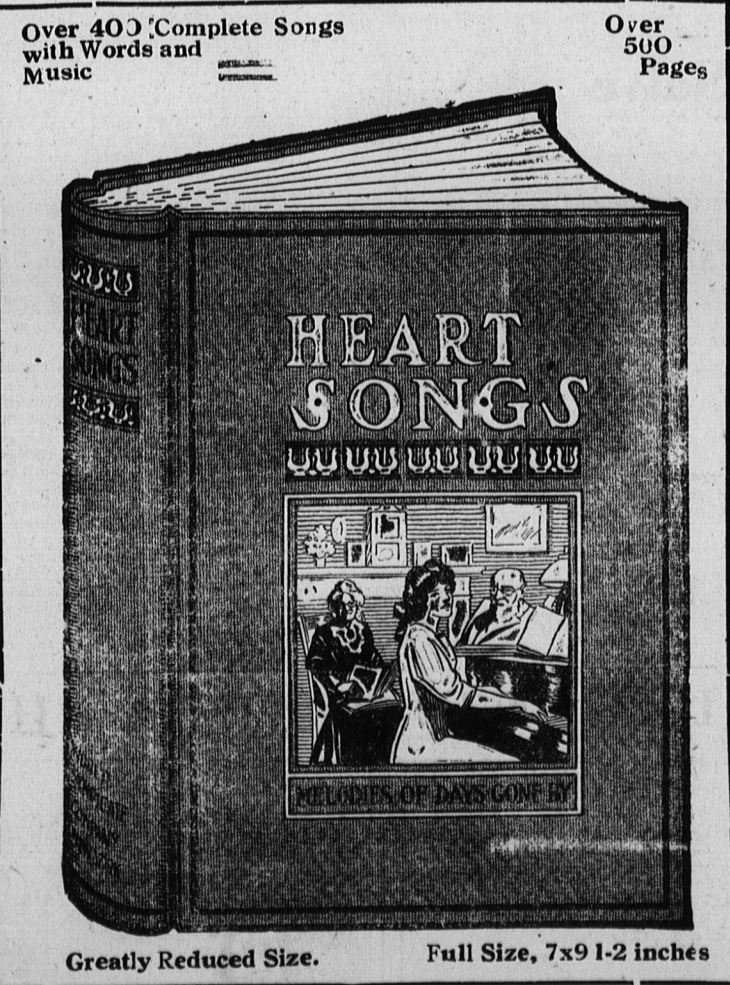
