## Fred Perry Advances To Semi-finals At Forest Hills At Expense Of Shields

### Englishman Forced To Extra Set To Win Match. Displays Fine Sportsmanship During Hard Fought Game.

FOREST HILLS, N.Y., Sept. 8.—(A.P.)—Big Frank Shields knocked at the door of fame today, but Fred Perry of England was on the other side of the barrier and refused to let him in with the result the dazling Briton moved another step closer to his third straight United States singles tennis championship.

Forced to an extra set for the first time in this tournament, Perry got down the challenge of the tall American by scores of 6-4, 6-8, 6-6, 6-6, a near capacity crowd of more than 15,000 spectators cheered themselves hoarse.

Leading 5-4 in the third set and the advantage in his favour in the ninth game on service, Shields left the ground for a high volley just in time to avoid a backhand shot which would have won the match. The giant New Yorker, who is pursuing a movie career in Hollywood, fell with a sickening thud on his back, losing the point and, subsequently, the game and the set.

Thus he muffed his chance of forcing Perry to the limit.

### PERRY IN SEMI-FINALS

This victory advanced Perry to the semi-final round where he will meet the veteran Texan, Wilmer Allison of Austin. Playing like a whirlwind, Allison eliminated the next to the last foreign contender, Enrique Mainer of Spain, in straight sets, 6-2, 6-4, 6-4.

Allison and Perry were finalists a year ago with the Briton winning in a homeric five-set battle.

The other semi-finalists will be decided tomorrow when Bryan M. Grant Jr., of Atlanta meets red-headed Don Budge, the Oakland, Calif., youngster favored to reach the final with Perry, and Sidney E. Wood Jr., of New York takes on Gregory S. Mangin of Newark, N. J., upset conqueror of big Roderich Menzel of Czechoslovakia.

### Shields Determined

Shields, fighting to protect his no. three national ranking, was a grim and determined player against Perry. Once he shook his fist at an official who called a footfault against him when he was at set point in the second chapter.

The crowd squawked loud and long. Perry sided with and sympathized with Shields. In a fine gesture of sportsmanship, he purposely outed Shields' next serve and the set went to the American. After that Perry walked over to the official and, shaking his head furiously, told him he was wrong.

## N. S. Amateur Succumbs To Injuries

ANTIGONISH, N. S., Sept. 8.—Charles Kimball Jarvis, 21-year-old Clydeale amateur boxer, died in hospital here today from injuries suffered last night when his bicycle was in collision with a truck driven by Duncan Fraser of Antigonish.

The accident occurred at a sharp turn in the highway two miles from Antigonish. According to Willoughby Digdon, who owned the truck and was sitting beside Fraser in the front seat, the bicycle swerved and "zig-zagged" in front of the approaching automobile, leaving its driver little chance to avoid an accident.

Struck on the head by the projecting side of the truck, Jarvis was picked up unconscious from the road and rushed to hospital.

## Hawks Again Trounced By Gateways 8-1

DOMINION, N. S., Sept. 8.—Employing a veteran battery with surprisingly sensational results, Yarmouth Gateways continued their merciless pounding of Dominion Hawks Saturday as they took their second straight victory 8-1 in the finals for the Nova Scotia baseball championship.

Tiny right-handed Cliff Surrette rose to glory in the game when he went through the nine innings and only allowed three hits. It was a great climax to his comeback season after almost three years' retirement.

Behind the bat, Surrette's old mate, aging Murray Veno, reached heights of his own. The veteran catcher had three hits and scored two runs for the defending champions.

Bobby Kennedy, Hawks' right-hander was found for 15 hits before he went to the showers at the beginning of the ninth inning and Smokey Joe Kelly took the mound, silencing the Yarmouth bats.

From the first, it appeared the Gateways were out to duplicate their feat of last year—taking the high-flying Hawks in three straight games. Capitalising on three hits off Kennedy and two errors against his mates, Yarmouth scored three runs in the opening inning.

Another rally in the sixth gave them two more runs. They scored one in the seventh and marked up a final two markers in the eighth. Dominion's lone run came in the second, a pure gift from Surrette who weakened momentarily at that time when Johnny McMullen hit safely and reached second on McCullen's sacrifice. The Yarmouth hurler had two wild pitches in a row that allowed McMullen to cross the plate.

Yarmouth provincial champions for the last two years in a row, won the first game here Friday 14-0. The two teams now journey to the western Gateway town for the deciding game.

## BRIGHTON HAWKS WIN FROM COWBOYS

Chiefs Spring Surprise In International

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—Syracuse Chiefs, a real "dark horse," captured second place from Buffalo and Newark Bears, pennant winners for the past three years outlasted Baltimore to take fourth place today as the International League wound up one of its most exciting pennant races in years.

Montreal Royals finished first, taking the pennant for the first time since 1898.

Six clubs were involved in the keen battle for the flag and for the four places in the post-season playoffs which start Tuesday. The Royals, running either first or second most of the time since mid-June, put on a final spurt which clinched the pennant for them last Friday, but it took longer to decide the other playoff spots.

Toronto Maple Leafs, who finished sixth, retained an outside chance of getting fourth place until Saturday, while Baltimore's Orioles weren't definitely relegated to the second division until Newark took the first game of today's doubleheader to clinch fourth place.

The playoffs send Montreal against Buffalo Bisons and Syracuse against Newark in the preliminary round. Each series is to be four out of seven games. The two winners will meet in another series for the Governors' Cup and the largest share of the \$10,000 bonus fund collected by a one-cent levy on admission at all parks.

The Royals, by finishing first, already earned \$2,500 of this fund. Another \$5,000 goes to the playoff winner and \$2,500 to the runner-up.

## British Ryder Cup Team Confident

LEATHERHEAD, England, Sept. 8.—The British Ryder Cup squad is so confident of lifting the international professional golf trophy that it's been insured for a trans-Atlantic journey.

Speaking at a luncheon for the team, Commander R. T. C. Ree, the manager, said yesterday: "The British team has got its tail up and is far from suffering from an inferiority complex. We've gone so far, in fact, as to insure the Ryder Cup for a return journey to England."

The matches against America's picked pros will be played at Ridgewood, N. J., Sept. 28-29.

## Women's Golf Tournament Starts Today

VANCOUVER, B. C., Sept. 8.—Three score and ten Canadian and United States feminine golf artists were ready tonight for tomorrow's tee off in the medal round of the Canadian Women's Open Golf Championship, in an 18-hole route over the seagirt, 6,386-yard course of Jericho Golf and Country Club.

To the 64 entries on the draw when the list closed Friday night were added another six post-entries with expectations that several more would file from Seattle and Victoria before starting time, 9:30 a. m. Monday. Latest entries included Elizabeth Simms of Seattle, Jean Menard of Moose Jaw, and Mrs. James Giendy of Calgary.

Conceded Canada's chief hope of retaining the title won last year by Mrs. Alexa Sterling Fraser of Ottawa, Ada MacKenzie of Toronto will start the championship parade with her toughest barrier to the Dominion crown which she has held four times, Dorothy Traugott of San Francisco, teeing off later in the day.

Mrs. Fraser is not defending her crown.

Fresh from her Jasper Park triumphs where she won the women's totem pole title, Miss MacKenzie stroked her way over Jericho links yesterday in 83, three over women's par, as Joyce Wethered's partner against two crack Vancouver professionals, Dave Black and Alex Duthie. It was Miss MacKenzie's first trip over the tricky course and observers were emphatic that she was headed for another national crown once she accustomed herself to the rolling, hilly, fairways. In addition to her four open titles Miss MacKenzie holds five closed championships.

Principal coast threat in the title picture is Miss Kaye Farrell, former British Columbia champion, who will be playing over her home course.

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## Hubbell Wins 21st Victory Of Season Defeating Pirates; Cards Split Doubleheader

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—The sweeping slants of Carl Hubbell won for him his 21st victory of the season today as New York beat Pittsburgh 3-1.

Manager Bill Terry helped his slim southpaw by banging out four hits, one of them a triple that followed a similar blow by Jackson.

This was in the sixth inning with the score tied. Terry counted a second later on Ott's long fly.

Brooklyn's fifth place Dodgers secured that position for the duration of their four-game series with Cincinnati today by taking both ends of a double bill 8-4 and 6-4.

They won the opener mainly on five Red errors, in the first two frames, and the second by routing three pitchers from the hill.

Dizzy Dean and five other members of the League leading Cardinals' hurling corps pitched two fourth games today but Philadelphia got the breaks to take the nightcap 4-2 after being blanked 11-0 in opener.

Dizzy had the Phillies helpless in the first game and the Phillies bunched their four runs in the nightcap in the second inning on two errors, a walk, a single and a double. They were able to annex only two more hits during the game while the Cardinals were pounding out 13, but hard luck and thoughtless base running kept the World Champions from overcoming the handicap.

Boston was rained out at Chicago.

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—The Yankees pulled a couple of garrison finishes today to defeat Cleveland in both ends of a doubleheader 3-2 and 5-4. The double victory put them 9 1-2 games ahead of the Indians and 8 1-2 games behind the league leading Tigers, who lost to Washington.

The opener went ten innings after Tony Lazzari belted a homer in the ninth to save Lefty Gomez from a defeat after the star southpaw had fanned 10 batsmen in eight innings.

The second game was decided in the ninth inning when Red Rolfe's single, two errors and intentional pass crammed the corners and George Selkirk, the burly Canadian, hoisted a fly and let Rolfe score the winning run. Lou Gehrig smacked his 28th homer of the year in the third.

## Senators Defeat Tigers

Roxie Lawson, rookie Detroit pitcher who had won his two previous starts by shutouts, walked across the winning run in the ninth inning at Washington to give the Senators a 4-3 victory over the pace-setting Tigers.

After being baffled by Lawson's effective slants for six innings, the Senators came to life and scored two runs in the seventh. In the ninth, Kuhel singled and scored on Myer's single. Then, after filling the bases Lawson walked Roberto Estallella to force in the winning run.

The Red Sox moved from fifth to fourth place in the American League race at Boston, changing places with Chicago White Sox whom they defeated 6-2 and 5-2 before 23,000.

The Perrell brothers, pitcher Wes and catcher Rick, drove in five of the Red Sox runs in the first game and Wes scored the sixth run himself as he recorded his 22nd victory of the season.

Errors by Appling and Hayes accounted for two of Boston's five runs in the second game.

Losing a doubleheader to St. Louis and running their losing streak to 11 straight, the Athletics fell into the American League cellar at Philadelphia while the victorious Browns took possession of seventh place. The scores of the Mack defeats were 9-4 and 7-5.

Two four-run innings gave the Browns the first game, in which Sugar Cain subdued his old team with seven hits. The Browns, aided by Carl Doyle's nine passes, fought an uphill battle to wipe out an early 4-0 disadvantage in the nightcap.

## SATURDAY BASEBALL

NEW YORK, Sept. 8.—The league-leading Detroit Tigers smeared Philadelphia Athletics in both ends

of a doubleheader Saturday, winning the first game 9-7, and then rubbing it in with a 15-1 win. Elden Auken pitched two-hit ball in the second game while in the opener Jimmy Foxx belted two home runs.

New York Yankees defeated Chicago White Sox 5-2 in the second game after losing the opening encounter 3-2. Ted Lyons holding the Yanks to five hits in the opener.

Cleveland Indians also won both ends of a doubleheader, smothering a ninth-inning rally by Boston Red Sox with a triple play to win the first game 5-3. They took the second 5-4. Washington Senators held on to sixth place by defeating St. Louis Browns 7-4 and were tied at 4-4 then a second contest was called in the 10th inning on account of darkness.

## GIANTS IN THIRD PLACE

New York Giants were tumbled into third place in the National League Saturday, 1 1/2 games behind Chicago and four behind St. Louis Cardinals. They lost to Cincinnati Reds 4-2. Fred Fitzsimmons failed as a starting pitcher and the Reds made their four runs in the first two innings. Gene Schott limited the Giants to six hits.

Chicago Cubs shut out the Phillies 4-0 behind Augie Galan's pitching. The Cardinals won their sixth in a row, defeating Boston Braves 8-5. Paul Dean won his 17th victory, but largely through the heavy hitting of his teammates. In the remaining game Pittsburg leads the measure of Brooklyn Dodgers 5-4 to sweep their three-game series.

## SPLIT DOUBLEHEADER

Montreal and Toronto divided an International League doubleheader in the Queen City Saturday. Pete Appleton registering his 23rd victory of the season to win the opener for the Royals 9-5. The Leafs took the second game 5-1 behind the five-hit pitching of Jimmy Patison.

Buffalo lost a chance to take undisputed possession of second place when Rochester won a 3-0 victory in the second half of a doubleheader. The Bisons took the first game 9-5.

Newark Bears swept both ends of a night doubleheader with Albany, winning 10-0 and 4-3. In the remaining scheduled game, Syracuse defeated Baltimore 5-4.
