## Canadian Wins U. S. Skiing Title

(By The Canadian Press)

**BIG MOUNTAIN, Mont., March 6**—Yves Lattreille, skiing instructor from Ste. Annde, Que., sailed down Big Mountain Saturday at more than 80 miles an hour to win the United States downhill championship.

It was the first time a Canadian had won a national ski championship event in the United States. Lattreille's time was one minute, 59 2/5 seconds. The 25-year-old Canadian bested some of the world's top skiers who completed over a rugged two-mile course which has a 2,500-foot drop from the top of Big Mountain near the northwestern Montana town of Whitefish.

Oldtimers described the condition of the course as "good." Canada's famed Wurtelle twins finished second and third in the women's downhill, won by Andrea Mead, 16-year-old high school girl from Stowe, Vt. Miss Mead's time for the shorter 1 1/2-mile course was 1:30.2.

## Durnan's 4th Shutout As Canadiens Move Into Second Place

**BOSTON, March 6**—(AP)—Montreal Canadiens hopped over Boston's Bruins into second place in the National Hockey League tonight on a 1-0 victory in which Big Bill Durnan performed in sensational style to hang up his fourth straight shutout. The lone tally was a backhander by Maurice (The Rocket) Richard at 19:32 of the opening period.

Durnan, four-time winner of the Vezina Trophy and shooting for his fifth this season, completed 205 minutes and 45 seconds of scoreless play with tonight's shutout. This record has been surpassed only twice in the last 20 years. Normie Smith of Detroit went 292 minutes and 24 seconds without being scored on in the 1936 playoffs. Durnan, four-time winner of the longest N.H.L. game in history when the Red Wings beat Montreal Maroons 1-0 after 176 minutes. In the 1930-31 season, the late Chuck Gardiner chalked up 290 minutes and 12 seconds of scoreless hockey for Chicago Black Hawks.

Before that, Alex Connell of the old Ottawa Senators established the all-time record in the 1927-28 season with 446 minutes and nine seconds of shutout play, including six straight shutouts.
