PROHIBITION CASE—The prohibition case against Mrs. Mary E. McKinnon, City, came up for hearing Wednesday, it being for the offence of keeping for sale. It appears that a search warrant had been issued and on search of the premises being made, beer was found that contained over 3 per cent. of alcohol. On the trial the evidence given in support of the charge of keeping for sale was that of the Police Officer who made the search, who testified to having found the beer on the premises; and the analyst who tested the beer. The police officer gave evidence of finding the beer. Mr. Inman, for the defendant, argued that a prima facie case had not been made out, because no evidence had been given of there having been found on the premises any beer pumps, or things such as are usually found in places where liquor is sold. The case was adjourned till the 15th of November.

ISLANDER MENTIONED—A Regina contemporary says:—At least two men are in for military honors for courage and effective work in a tight place according to reports from the front. They are Captain J. A. Cullum M. D., medical officer of the 28th battalion, and Private H. B. Compton, a bomber. The occasion was the explosion of a German mine under the trenches occupied by the 28th battalion, which is commanded by Lieut. Col. J. P. L. Ebury of Regina, and includes among its officers Major J. A. Cross, Major Read, Quartermaster McEara, Captain Walter McInnis, Lieut. Styles, Lieut. Child and others, Major Alex. Ross was formerly with the battalion, but is now back in England on special duty under the British war office. When the mine was exploded a number of the 28th men were buried in the dirt. Private Compton was buried along with the others, but after being dug out set to work to rescue the wounded, and worked like a Trojan for an hour or more. He has been recommended for the Distinguished Conduct medal. Private Compton is a son of Mrs. Isabelle Compton, Bangor, P. E. I., Captain Cullum is to be mentioned in dispatches for his signal bravery and pluck on the same occasion. He helped rescue wounded and buried men, and went right down into the crater made by the mine, under a withering fire from all kinds of German guns, to dig men out with his bare hands.

Rev. Alfred Hall Addressed Students


The Rev. Alfred Hall, Strathcona Commissioner, who, as reported in Wednesday's Guardian, is here to present to the Legislature a bust of Lord Nelson to mark the conclusion of the Nelson shields distribution, yesterday gave an interesting lecture on the British Navy to the students of Prince of Wales College and also of Prince Street and West Kent schools. At Prince of Wales College Mr. Hall received an enthusiastic ovation and his audience was highly appreciative. He opened his address by pointing out that as all people in the British Empire belonged to a maritime race it was very desirable, as part of their education, to know about ships and flags and the personnel of the various fleets and the equipment of the various navies. Dismissing any allusion to the immense land forces engaged in the war, the speaker concentrated his attention on the sea forces of Britain and her Allies and Germany

and her Allies. Statistics showed that the difference in sea power between the two sides was so immense as to make war perfectly insane. In dramatic sentences he drew a word-picture of the position of the two fleets at present on the German ocean. He strongly counselled the students to follow the continuous narrative of the war, so far as its sea development was concerned, and they would see that the glories of Trafalgar had been surpassed by the achievements of the Navy in the present time, while yet the big ships had not fired a gun. The students followed the address with the keenest interest and broke into uproarious applause as the speaker made various points. A vote of thanks on behalf of the student body was proposed and seconded from among their number. With the lecture to-night in Prince of Wales College Hall, lantern slides will be shown in three series as having to do with (1) the achievements of Nelson and his fleet 110 years ago; (2) the great work in which Mr. Hall is engaged, welfare work among the sailors of the world; (3) the war and its influence upon the "welfare" work.

\$225,000 Fire Loss in Sorel, Quebec

SOREL, Que., Nov. 9.—A fire loss approximating \$225,000 was caused in Sorel this afternoon from an explosion of gasoline during the process of candy making in the confectionery shop of George Ghanotou, a Greek, on George Street, a considerable portion of the town being wiped out by the flames. Included in the buildings burned was the convent.
