THE PRINCE CELEBRATES BATTLE OF JUTLAND DAY

Inspects Australian Naval Seamen and 6000 School Children in Physical Training. Greatly Impressed with the Latter

(Special to The Guardian.) MELBOURNE, June 2.—The anniversary of the battle of Jutland was celebrated here by the Prince by an inspection of the Australian naval seamen. The Prince also attended a remarkable display by six thousand school children, illustrating conspicuously the advantages accruing from the national compulsory system of physical training of all pupils in the primary and high schools. This system is now in force in Australia as well as in New Zealand where the Prince on his recent visit was much impressed with the usefulness of the system. The returned soldiers and sailors welcomed and entertained the royal visitor at a great demonstration last night.

CANADIAN OFFICER NOW IN LONDON

Settling Canada's War Account with Great Britain also for Equipment for Canadian Divisions.

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—Col C. S. Harrington, K. C., of Halifax, is here, winding up the final accounts of the Canadian army with the British Department. Col. Harrington, who is Deputy Minister of the Canadian Overseas Military Forces, arrived here several weeks ago, and has been busy completing the work, which is a stupendous proportion. During five years war the Canadian ministry delivered about one hundred million pounds through the British War Office and an equal amount in cash payments. It is the former account, Harrington is engaged in concluding. It is understood the balance due the British War Office is not large, but that that England became through war loans a large debtor to Canada. Harrington is also arranging for full equipment to supply four divisions in the Canadian army.

MOST SENSATIONAL RAID YET BY SINN FEINERS

Fifty Armed Men Raided King's Inn in the Heart of Dublin, Overpowered the Sentries and got away with a Quantity of Munitions.

DUBLIN, June 2.—The most sensational and daring raid yet staged by the Sinn Fein took place yesterday afternoon in the heart of Dublin, when fifty armed men without disguise descended on King's Inn, headquarters of the legal profession here and seized a quantity of munitions, escaping without leaving a trace. King's Inn, which is the training school for law students, has been heavily raided since the outbreak of the recent disturbances. It is in the centre of the busiest part of the city, but it was completely taken by surprise when the raiders rushed the sentries and overpowered them with apparent ease and forced their way to the guardroom.

Another European War Threatened

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, June 2.—The possibility of another European war in the near future is forecast today by the French government and press regarding the part Germany may play in the situation in Poland. Editorial comment showed deep concern at the possible late now confronting Poland. The Swiss declared in a dispatch today that several members of the German government met in Switzerland last week and discussed the possibility of German participation in activities on the Polish front. Experts here, it is declared, had pointed out to the meeting that Germany immediately could put 700,000 men in the field against France and 300,000 against Poland. The plan was temporarily abandoned, he said, owing to uncertainty expressed by German leaders that other powers would remain neutral.

Prince George Leaves for Cruise

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—Prince George, youngest son of the King and Queen, after becoming a cadet yesterday, sailed today on the battleship "Temeiraire" for a seven months cruise.

France To Send Help to Poland?

LONDON, June 2.—France is planning to send 100,000 troops of her colonial forces to help Poland against Russia, the Daily Graphic's Berlin correspondent has learned in diplomatic circles. No official confirmation of the report could be obtained here today. The Paris Martin today published reports from Warsaw that the Polish diet has decided to serve diplomatic relations with Czechoslovakia.

WOMEN'S MISSIONARY SOCIETY CONVENTION

Large Number of Delegates in Attendance. Much Interest Taken in the Proceedings.

The 35th annual meeting of the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Branch of the Women's Missionary Society of the Methodist Church opened yesterday morning at 9 o'clock in the Heart Memorial Hall, with a good attendance.

The evening meeting opened with devotional exercises led by Rev. Mr. Glendenning. The reports of officers followed. Mrs. Clarke of Chatham submitted the financial report, which showed a total increase for the year of \$4,436.60.

Mrs. E. A. Westmoreland then introduced the new study book for the year, "The Bible and Missions of the King's Birthday," which she gave an interesting synopsis, and urged the delegates to take full advantage of the literature on sale.

Mexican President Has Appendicitis

(Dom. Press Special.) MEXICO CITY, June 1.—An announcement was made this evening that Adolfo de Lahuerta, the Provisional President, is ill in bed here with appendicitis. Just how ill the President is was not disclosed by his private secretary.

Report on Egypt Shortly Expected

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—The report of Milner Commission on Egypt is expected any moment. The Foreign Office is awaiting cabinet authority. One of the important questions the report will deal with is return of present cumbersome judicial system in Egypt. Drafting of an entirely new penal code, it is expected, will be recommended.

Holiday Proposed For June 3

(Dom. Press Special.) OTTAWA, June 1.—Formal notice that he will move for a holiday in the Commons for the celebration of the King's birthday, was placed on the order paper by Sir Robert Borden tonight. The motion is expected to go through on a unanimous vote of the House tomorrow. The senate will probably adopt like action.

Newsprint Advances To \$130 a Ton

(Special to The Guardian.) MONTREAL, June 2.—The Canadian Export Paper Company Limited this morning announced its schedule of export newsprint paper prices for the third and fourth quarters of the current year. The new prices show very large advances over those prices previously prevailing on their export paper prices. For the third quarter of 1920 which commences July 1 next the new prices will be 5 1/2 cents a pound which is equivalent to \$110 a ton; for the fourth quarter of 1920 which commences October 1 next, the new prices will be 6 1/2 cents a pound which is equivalent to \$130 a ton.

BANK MANAGER TEMPLE TANGIBLY REMEMBERED

Departing Banker Received Suitable Expressions of Regard from Friends. His Successor Welcomed to City.

A large and representative gathering assembled at the Council Chamber, City Hall, last evening, the occasion being the presentation of a farewell address to Mr. G. C. Temple, manager of the branch of the Union Bank of Canada in this city who is about to leave for New Liskeard, Ont., to which place he has been transferred.

U. S. Officials Not Taxable

(Special to The Guardian.) WASHINGTON, June 2.—Provisions of the War Revenue Act requiring the President and all Federal judges to pay income tax on their salaries, were declared unconstitutional today by the Supreme Court in a 7 to 2 decision. Under the act the president paid on his salary of \$75,000 a year, approximately \$16,000 in taxes. Revenues already collected under the invalid provisions will, under the court's decision, be refunded by the treasury.

Caillaux Has Returned to Paris

PARIS, June 2.—With permission of the Minister of the Interior, former Premier Caillaux, convicted of dealings with enemy and obstructionist tactics during the war, has returned to Paris. He has been allowed to remain for several days for the purpose of restoring his health.

Severe Storm Strikes Ottawa

OTTAWA, June 2.—A terrific storm broke over Ottawa yesterday afternoon when two buildings hit by lightning were destroyed, electric services interrupted, many windows broken by hail, awnings and trees blown down and street car service stopped. In twenty minutes during which the storm raged 1.43 inches rain fell which is highest ever recorded in this city.

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British Interests Safe In Persia

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—In reply to a question in the House of Commons today regarding Bolshevik activity in Persia, Cecil B. Harmsworth, British Secretary for Foreign Affairs, said the Persian Minister in London had been in constant touch with the British Foreign Office and a complete understanding had been reached that both Persian and British interests would be safe guarded.

Four Cent Postage Now in England

(Special to The Guardian.) LONDON, June 2.—The new four cent first class postal rate went into effect today. It affects all inland letters and parcels and letters to the British possessions and the United States. One departmental store here estimates the increased expenditure under the advance at \$50,000 annually.
