

NEW PROPOSAL TO POSTIES

(Canadian Press) TORONTO, June 26.—"A new proposition has been made by authorities at Ottawa to postal strikers here that 'important negotiations' in progress would lead to a settlement of differences between the employees and Canadian government within thirty-six hours showed no signs of materializing this morning. No definite statements have been made by federation officials as to who the persons are who are conducting the negotiations, but the strikers are urged to be patient, promises being made of early developments of a favorable character."

The government's new proposition, he said, "would be considered by dominion and local strikers committees today and would be laid before the strikers at a closed meeting this afternoon."

Increased Immigration Needed To Lighten Taxes

Canada's Gift To League Of Nations Building

Low, Minister of Trade and Commerce and James Murdoch, Minister of Labor, have recommended to the government that the doors on the main floor of the new building being erected for the League of Nations at Geneva, be dedicated by Canada and that a suitable tablet be placed in the entrance hall of the building to commemorate the gift. The material placed in the door and the workmanship would be Canadian.

World Fliers Are Off Again

(Canadian Press) CALCUTTA, British India, June 26.—The U. S. round-the-world fliers, who started from the east coast of Alaska on the eastern coast of the Bay of Bengal, according to messages this afternoon. Earlier despatches reported the United States party had reached Chittagong, province of Bengal, but these proved erroneous.

Damini's parents closed today. Irish Free State Plenipotentiary For Washington

He added the Government trusted this proposal would be acceptable to the United States.

Scattered between Whitcomb and Sarazen are a number of Englishmen and Scotchmen with a couple of continental players and two title hunting professionals from United States.

SOVIET OFFICIAL TO ATTEND LEAGUE

(Canadian Press) GENEVA, June 26.—Following an announcement by Dr. Giuseppe Motta, Switzerland's representative in the League of Nations, that Switzerland had no objection, Russia is expected soon to send an official observer to Geneva. The Soviet government has been showing the keenest interest in what collaboration, if any, the United States and Germany are giving the league. A secretariat has been keeping Moscow fully informed. It is believed that Russia's future attitude toward the league depends considerably on the outcome of the Anglo-Russian negotiations in London.
