**THE WAR.**

The report current at Tokio, as recorded in despatches to the evening papers, to the effect that Russia has offered to surrender Port Arthur and the warships in the harbor on certain conditions, is worthy of having originated in Chefoo. The offer is said to have been made through France, and the condition said to be that the garrison shall be allowed to go free. It is observed that the fortress, fleet and the outworks, (including Dalny of which the Japanese already have possession) represent Russian capital to the amount of about \$300,000,000. The release of the garrison would also release a larger number of Japanese troops now engaged in the siege or near at hand. The transfer of the fleet would give Togo some more ships and place Vladivostock and its squadron quite at its mercy. A more childish and incredible report has seldom been sent over the wires. We may rest assured that Port Arthur will not be surrendered without a fight.

In another week and a day, July 13, the Laurier Government will have been in power eight years.

Premier Peters and Bayfield Williams called yesterday their safe arrival in London the day before.

He has been for seventeen years connected with St. Peter's Church and school, and has now accepted the position of Lecturer in Hebrew and Divinity in Trinity College, Toronto. The young men who have enjoyed his careful tutelage in the school, the many who have attended his ministrations as assistant to the Priest Incumbent and the larger number of citizens who know Dr. Hunt as a kindly and courteous Christian gentleman will join with The Guardian in wishing him great usefulness and as much of happiness as may be in his new sphere of work.

We are still waiting, not very patiently to hear what Ottawa will do about the railway station, the extension of the railway along the city water-front, and the improvement of the telegraph service. Things move at a snail's pace in Island affairs at the capital. The matter of the telegraph service has been the more urgent from the fact that the company was to enter upon a new year on 1st July and that date is now past. In the meantime the "Government of all the talents" has left this Province to go on paying double rates for a half day service. After eight years of power the Government ought to do something in this matter. If only for very shame's sake.

The New Brunswick Government has for a good while past had two vacant portfolios, while two seats in the Legislature, one for the city and one for the county of St. John are also vacant. The people have been amused meanwhile with the Tercentenary parade, and have perhaps given more thought to Champlain and De Monts than to politics. But sometime in the more or less distant future they will again turn their attention to provincial affairs and Premier Tweedie will have to "get busy" along the same lines. St. John is a more or less capricious constituency, and always has a large number of the class who, like the traditional Irishmen are "agin the Government." All of which adds to the interest of the situation.

**SUPREME COURT.**
