The next regular meeting of the Auxiliary will be held on Thursday, April 8th, at Mrs. Cephas Tweedy's home.

LAW STUDENTS' UNION.—At a meeting of the law students held in the Law Library on Thursday, the 4th inst., a Society known as the Law Students' Union of Prince Edward Island, and having for its objects the advancement of the common law interests of the student body, was organized. A constitution and by-laws were drawn up and, with some alterations and amendments, adopted. A letter from Mr. Norman McLeod, containing many valuable suggestions, was read and received the unanimous approval of the meeting. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year:—President, Hon. J. A. Mathieson, Premier and Attorney-General; President, S. S. Heston; Vice-President, Norman McLeod; Secretary-Treasurer, Justin Hynes; Executive Committee, J. Howatt, A. Leard and C. P. McCarthy. It is expected that this society, ushered into being under such auspicious circumstances, and under the capable direction of its worthy President shall prove of much practical value to the students. A series of lectures has been arranged and many prominent members of the bench and bar have already consented to give addresses on subjects of legal interest.

COMPLAINTS ANSWERED.—Regarding the complaints of increase in the electric light bills it may be stated that any party using light who may be dissatisfied with their bills may have their meter tested by the Inspector appointed by the Dominion Government. If the meter should be wrong the Company will pay for the test and will rebate the customer from the time the meter was installed. If, however, the meter is found to be correct the customer will pay for the test. It may be stated that the Government may consider any meter correct if 3 per cent fast or slow. This percentage is allowed. If 15 meters are installed in the city, 600 tested by Government Inspector have been found to be correct; about 300 running from 1/2 of 1 per cent to 2 1/2 per cent, fast and about same number slow. There is no doubt that owing to the fact that day power has been installed customers are using more light unconsciously than when they had to wait for the lights to come on. The matter resolves itself into this that every light taker has the matter in his own hands and if in any way he has been unfairly in any way may have recourse to inspection.

SCOTCHFORTH.—Mr. Cain, School Inspector, paid his annual visit to Glenroy School on Thursday, March 4th.—Mr. Ronnie Gillis, St. Peter's Bay, was in Scotchfort recently on a business trip. SOCIAL SERVICE AND EVANGELISM.—The report of the Presbytery Committee on Social Service and Evangelism was submitted at the Presbytery meeting on Tuesday. The function of this committee of which the Rev. H. J. Fraser is Convener, is to obtain reports from the various sessions regarding different aspects of social and religious life. The subjects dealt with on the present occasion were "Temperance" and "Vice," and the report of the committee referred to the views expressed by the sessions. After discussion, the report together with the customary resolutions on the subject were adopted in the following terms:—"Inasmuch as the reports of sessions are practically unanimous in the statement that there is a large traffic in intoxicants, and such statements as the following appear, 'The prohibitory law is very weakly administered, especially in some districts.' 'Officials are 'tax, negligent,' inefficient, and in some cases 'apparently under influences which interfere with the proper execution of the law.' 'The Government declines to employ sufficiently energetic methods for its enforcement,' the attention of the Presbytery is called particularly to the spectacle we have witnessed in the recent investigation and its issue. The Court therefore resolves as follows:—"Recognizing the great value of the Prohibitory Law, the good it has done, and is doing, recognizing also the gravity of the situation, and the fact that the Church must find a solution for these conditions, the Presbytery refers this report to Sessions for their earnest consideration, and calls upon them to bring these problems before the people, holding public meetings in every district within the bounds, and promoting educational and personal work in the interests of Temperance and good citizenship." And, "Whereas it is reported that social vice, with disastrous results to the body and mind, as well as to the soul, is in evidence in some parts of the province," The Court therefore resolves "That Ministers and Sessions be instructed to learn to what extent, if any, the ravages of social vice prevail, and to report to a later meeting, so that, if necessary, educative and other action may be taken with a view of lessening, and preventing in future, the degenerations and corruption which the social vice inflicts, alike on the guilty and the guiltless."
