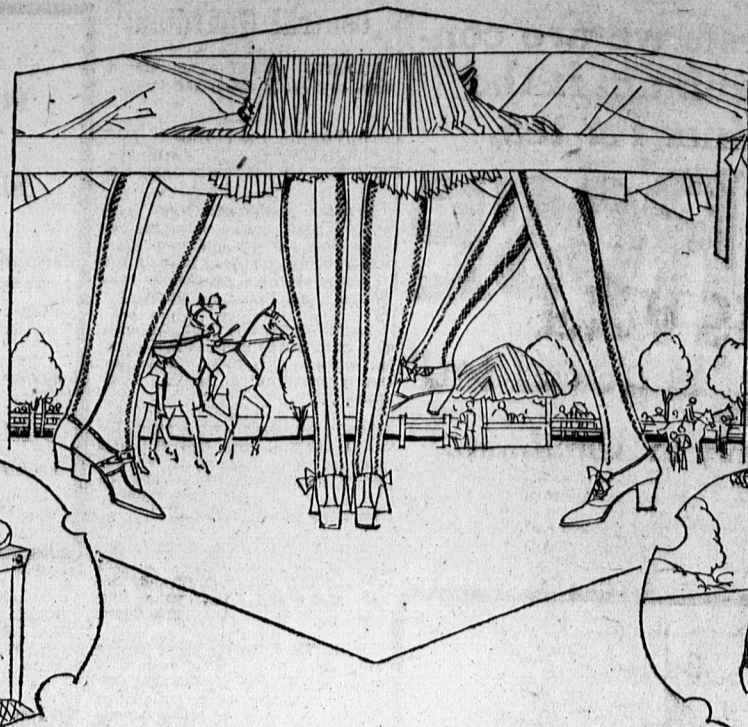

Huge Still Is Found In Abandoned Church
(Special to The Guardian)
DETROIT, June 22.—Police yesterday unearthed what is believed to be one of the largest alcohol distilling plants in the city, having its still in the pulpit of an abandoned church. Six tanks, holding a total of 6,000 gallons of alcohol, were found in the basement of the former place of worship.
Operators of the still used the former church edifice as a "blind" to avoid suspicion of their alleged activities, police believe.
The plant, which occupied the building formerly used as the Olivet Baptist Church, 675 Mullett Street, was discovered when fire, presumably caused by some explosion of alcohol, partially destroyed the church. Two alarms were necessary before the Fire Department got the flames under control.
Police believe the plant was used to convert denatured alcohol into grain alcohol for use in the manufacture of liquor.
