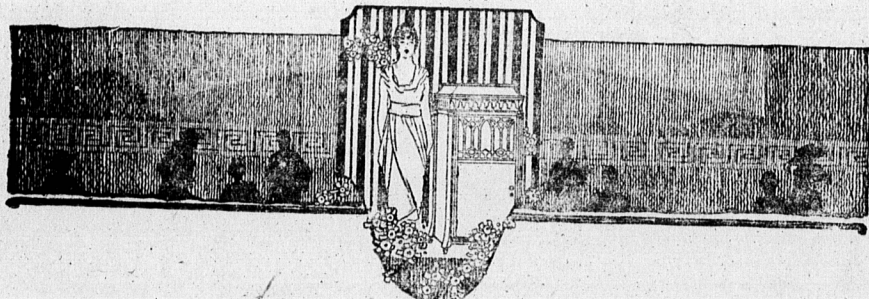

### The Markets

#### COUNTRY PRODUCE

MONTREAL, Jan. 8.—A feature of the local egg trade has been the weaker feeling in the market for strictly new laid eggs, and prices have declined, which is attributed to the increased production in the country and the more liberal supplies coming forward here, and sales in a wholesale jobbing way were made at 90c to 95c per dozen. On the other hand, there has been no change in the condition of the market for storage stock, prices being firmly maintained on account of the small supplies available and the continued demand for the same for home consumption. A sale of car lot of April cold storage eggs was made today at 70c per dozen. The receipts today were 324 cases, as compared with 1,321 for the same day last week, and 129 for the corresponding day a year ago.

Canadian National Railways announce that effective January 10th mixed trains No. 15 and 16 between Charlottetown and Souris will run on Monday, Wednesday and Friday instead of daily. Mixed trains No. 17 and 18 between Mount Stewart Jet. and Georgetown will run Monday, Wednesday and Friday instead of daily.

### market for turkeys, geese and chickens, and prices are lower, but the market for fowl and ducks is steady, and prices unchanged. The trade today was rather quiet on account of the fact that buyers in most cases had ample supplies on hand to meet immediate wants, and the demand in consequence was somewhat limited.

We quote wholesale jobbing prices as follows: Turkeys choice 52c to 53c Good turkeys 50c to 51c Geese 39c to 40c Chickens 39c to 40c Ducks 36c to 42c Fowls 26c to 32c There was no change in the condition of the market for potatoes, prices being steady, but there was no market improvement in the demand and the trade on the whole was quiet, with car loads of Green Mountains and Quebec stock quoted at \$1.60 to \$1.70 per bag of 90 lbs. ex-track, and sales in a wholesale jobbing way were made at \$1.75 to \$1.80 per bag of 80 lbs. ex-track. Chicago, Jan. 11.—Eggs, lower, Receipts 1,711 cases. At mark, cases included, 58c to 63c. New York, Jan. 11.—Eggs irregular. Receipts 13,846 cases. Fresh do, first, 65c to 66c. The receipts of butter today were 193 packages, as compared with 670 for the same day last week, and 123 for the corresponding day a year ago. The condition of the market today was unchanged, the feeling being firm, with a moderate amount of business passing in 25 and 50 package lots to meet immediate requirements, but the demand for car lots was somewhat limited, and the market on the whole was quiet, with finest grass made creamery noted at 52c to 53c per lb. and finest fresh made creamery at 50c to 51c while in a wholesale jobbing way finest sold at 54c per lb. in solid packages, and at 55c in 1-lb. blocks.

### Hints for the Motorist

#### THE ELECTRIC STARTER

The most usual way of applying the power of an electric motor supplied with current from the storage battery, to turn the engine over for starting purposes is by a gear connection, consisting of a pinion carried by the motor armature, that meshes directly (or indirectly) through a large gear carried on the face of the engine flywheel. As the turning power of the electric motor is required only until the engine starts under its own power, there are four stages in the starting operation, viz: The mechanical connection of the motor to the engine, by meshing the gears; the supply of current to the motor to cause it to turn the engine over; the mechanical disconnection of the motor and engine and the cutting off of current from motor. These operations may all be performed by a pedal, moved by the operator or they may be partly automatic. In laying out our lives, forgetting "the best way that shapes our ends."
