A WORLD'S RECORD.

G. T. R. BILL GOES TO GOVERNOR.

BOSTON, June 6—The Bill which would allow the Southern New England (Grand Trunk) Railway to extend its lines to this city, was enacted in the House of Representatives today. After being enacted in the Senate, the Bill was sent to Governor Foss. The Governor has five days in which to sign or to veto the Bill. If at the end of that time he has taken no action, it becomes a law without his signature.
