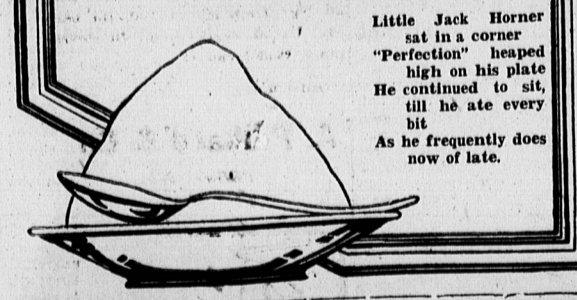

CROP REPORT

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received at the Head Office of the Bank of Montreal from its Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

GENERAL

In the Prairie Provinces crops are maturing rapidly. Cutting has started and should be general next week. Considerable lodging of grain has occurred, especially in Alberta, while frost and rust are reported from some sections in Saskatchewan and Manitoba. In Quebec harvesting is now general but settled weather is needed to assist operations and mature late crops. In contrast to the heavy yields of hay and grain in Ontario indications are that all other crops will be below average. In New Brunswick and Nova Scotia rust is appearing on potatoes but good average crops are still in prospect and pasturage conditions are excellent. In British Columbia weather continues favorable for all crops. Threshing is general and a good average crop of high quality seems assured. Details follow:—

PRAIRIE PROVINCES:

ALBERTA WESTERN AREA.—With favourable weather cutting will be general by the end of the month except from Lethbridge south where heavy rains will further delay harvesting. Other conditions generally are good. **ALBERTA NORTHEASTERN AREA.**—Grains are maturing rapidly. Cutting has commenced but harvesting will not be general until the end of this week. Prospects generally are favourable. **ALBERTA SOUTHEASTERN AREA.**—The rye crop is out and cutting will be general by 31st August. Prospects continue favourable for a very fair yield. **SASKATCHEWAN NORTHERN AREA.**—Harvesting should be general by the end of the month. Crops are heavy but the yield will be reduced

PROVINCE OF QUEBEC.

Harvesting of a good stand of grain is now general. Threshing has commenced. Haying is practically completed. The crop of small fruits and berries is heavy but apples are below average in size and quality. Tobacco is ripening rapidly and is of good appearance. Pasturage is good.

PROVINCE OF ONTARIO

Threshing is general. Rust is reported from many sections but in spite of this all grain and straw are good samples. Buckwheat with a good average is a heavy yield. Clover seed on the whole is disappointing. Corn is a poor crop. The corn bore is more prevalent than last year. Sugar beets, turnips and mangolds promise well, but potatoes, beans and tobacco appear only average. Apples are a light crop but peaches are showing better than expected.

MARITIME PROVINCES.

In New Brunswick potatoes are showing signs of rust and the yield may yet be materially reduced. Haying has been delayed by wet weather and the quality impaired. Oats are well headed with good straw. In Nova Scotia some early apples have been shipped. The estimate yield is now 1,300,000 barrels or about 80 per cent of a year average. Haying has been delayed by rain which is adversely affecting the quality. Potatoes are doing fairly well. In Prince Edward Island potatoes are looking well and prospects good for all crops.

PROVINCE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA

Roots are standing up well, recent rains having been beneficial.

SPRAYING THE BIRDS.

(Brandon Sun.)—With the information of aviators dusting large territories fields and growth with anti-preparations against pests and diseases there also comes news of rickety and lakes being strewn with dead birds. Near this city are reports of dead ducks in numbers. No explanation can be given. If the spreading of poisons in the air is killing birdlife and may be a danger to water fowl and fish, the cure of plant and field diseases may be as bad as the ailment. Some assurance on this matter should be given to the public in any case discrimination in distributing poison powders should be in order.

GRAZING IN NATIONAL FORESTS

The regulated grazing of livestock is permitted on Dominion forest reserves or national forests in the western provinces. The number of animals pastured in the national forests in the fiscal year ended, March 31, 1926, was: cattle, 40,722; horses, 10,822; sheep and hogs, 4,923.

WATER POWER DEVELOPMENT

The present recorded water-power resources of the Dominion will permit of a turbine installation of 41,700,000 horse power. The total hydraulic installation up to the end of 1926 throughout the Dominion was 4,556,226 horsepower or less than 11 per cent of the recorded water-power resources.
