RUSSIAN TROUBLES.

The word has gone out to the ends of the world that Russia is facing a serious internal crisis and that it will materialize about the beginning of next month. The first of May is "moving day" among many householders in this country, and the same date is said to be fixed for inaugurating a great movement in Russia. The work people in the cities and peasants in the country districts have been aroused by inflammatory appeals scattered broadcast by secret emissaries. The St. Petersburg workmen are preparing for a great demonstration. It is said that arms and bombs have been manufactured and smuggled in large quantities. All the Baltic Provinces are reported to be intensely excited. Cities and towns in the interior of Russia are applying for additional military protection. The cities are being flooded with revolutionary proclamations calling upon the people to rise and strike for freedom. Meantime the prisons are overflowing with suspected persons who have been arrested. There is clearly very serious trouble ahead in Russia apart from the disasters of the war.

J. C. Underhay, whose proposed plan for an embankment between the Capes has attracted some attention, writes the Examiner, "I would hardly favor at the present time agitating for anything but the Tunnel." Another valuable endorsement of the Tunnel project.

Since the Newfoundlanders showed a disposition to "get back" at the United States for its cavalier treatment of the Hay-Bond reciprocity treaty there appears to be a disposition on the part of the Washington Senate to reconsider the subject and pass favorably upon the treaty. Such is the latest word from Washington.

The United States Government has become possessed of the Panama Railway, and of certain connecting steamship lines on the Atlantic and the Pacific. This preparatory to the work of constructing the Panama Canal. The steamships will be in part utilized in carrying men, machinery and supplies to the canal works, but they and the railway will also carry on ordinary commercial traffic. This is, we believe the first instance of Government ownership of a railway and steamers in Uncle Sam's domain.

PHILADELPHIA'S NEW PUMPING STATION.

Streams of Water Can be Discharged From This Building to Unheard of Heights.

Fighting fires has been revolutionized in Philadelphia. Fire engines have been rendered obsolete and useless there by a plain, massive-looking brick building upon which the eyes of the world are fixed. This building guards all the central district of Philadelphia. In any part of the district at a second's notice it can discharge unheard-of streams of water to unheard-of heights. Suppose a twenty-one-story office building should take fire, six lines of hose, twice the size of any used elsewhere, could be attached to the nearest plug and from this one fireplug six great streams could be hurled simultaneously over the office building's roof. Such a miracle has never been seen before. A hose is fixed to an ordinary fire plug and instantly power enough is developed to send vast columns of water over the roofs of the tallest skyscrapers.

The building responsible for this miracle is the new pumping station, with its special pipe line eight miles long, that Philadelphia has just completed after three years work. The station contains nine pumps, and these are able to discharge, at a pressure of 300 pounds, 16,000,000 gallons of water a day.

New York, Chicago, Boston, London and Paris are watching the new station. They are already considering the erection of stations like it. Experts are constantly writing to inquire into its construction, and other experts, underwriters, engineers and firemen are constantly making personal inspections of it. For it is a new thing—a great advance. It is a much of an advance, indeed, as a twenty-three-story skyscraper would be in a world that heretofore had only had three- and four-story buildings. The station can throw upon a fire 10,000 gallons of water a minute, that is to say, there could be hurled upon a burning building the contents of a tank 63 feet long, 66 feet wide and 66 feet deep.

To be compared with this is the fire engine. A fire engine pumps 250 gallons of water a minute against the station's 10,000 gallons. Furthermore, the fire engine's pressure cannot be regulated like this pumping station's can, in fact scarcely be regulated at all. But the pumping station can discharge from the same fire plug, through a three- and one-half inch hose, one stream strong enough to tear the iron shutters from the top story windows of a skyscraper, and another stream, through a half-inch hose gentle enough to bathe a baby in. Two of the engines or units are small. They are each of 150 horsepower, and they have each a pumping capacity of 350 gallons of water a minute under a 380 pound pressure. The remaining seven units are large and their pumps will each deliver 1,400 gallons of water at 30 pounds pressure per minute. Each small engine consumes in operation 1,500 feet of gas per hour, and each large engine consumes 5,000 feet, but they will never need to run an hour continually, for no fire in the world could withstand so long the water they will throw. These great pumps are started electrically, and the pressure they put upon the water can be regulated to a hair.
