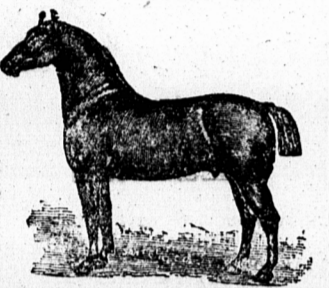

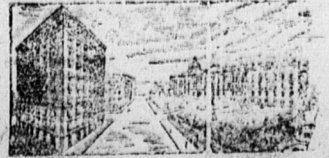

The attention of citizens is directed to the following Sections of the By-Laws of the Town of Summerside respecting private Street crossings, etc.— Every owner or occupier of any house, building or lot within the town who shall require to drive any horse or other animal, or wagon or other vehicle, across any sidewalk, for the purpose of entering his house or premises, shall construct and maintain across the drain, gutter or water course opposite the gateway or entrance to his premises, a good and sufficient bridge of sound plank, brick, stone, or like, so constructed and maintained as to satisfy the Town Council or a person authorized by them to inspect the same, and to be placed, so as not to obstruct the drain or water course in the gutter, and the Street Man is directed to remove all such crossings that are not in conformity to this By-Law. No person shall dig up or carry away any earth, sods or soil from any Street, road or lane within the Town. I am instructed to notify the public that the above By-Laws will be strictly enforced. H. After the ceremony the Summerside band, of which Mr. Sharp is a member, serenaded the happy couple. well matured and reach the limit of the stake. Only cut the leaf half back, which allows ample light and air without hurting the constitution of the plant. With this treatment I have never known insect or disease to hinder the plants, but had record crops that told the tale at the exhibition stands. The small, yellow plum tomato makes very good preserves. Planted three feet apart. It trails along the ground. By pruning out surplus growth, the thickly clustered fruits will ripen earlier.

GROWING TOMATOES.

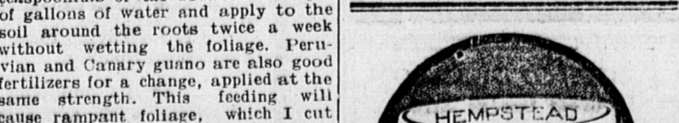
As tomatoes are generally appreciated by all, I would like to put into a practical form the mode of growing that is best adaptable for small gardens, and which will produce the most productive crop and of first class quality. I will not dwell here on the raising of plants from seed, as the list of countries is far advanced; although practical gardeners prefer all garden plants raised by themselves, and amateurs will find such more profitable, not to mention the pleasure derived from it. We will deal with the treatment given from the time of sowing. Two good varieties are Chalk's Early Jewel and Livingstone's Royal Red. Select a good open, sunny position, away from the shade of trees and buildings; damp, shaded aspects give only leaves and disease. The soil does not necessarily need to be rich, but it should be good and open. Fork it over and prepare in May. Have stakes five feet long, painted green, and drive them into the ground twelve inches, 2-12 feet apart each way. Have the stakes straight on all sides, as a means of gardening adds to its effectiveness. I prefer plants in pots to get early fruit, as no check is caused in transplanting. If lifted from a box, shading is required for a few days. Nothing is gained by planting before the 1st of June. Plant deep, as roots come out from the stem, and give a good watering. Tie to the stake with soft twine, preferably "raflia," supplied by seedsmen. Allow one central stem to climb the stake and pinch out every week all the growth in time would be at every leaf stage, unless for fruit. Give application of water every other day in dry spells. Do not think that removing these growth will reduce the tomato crop. The branches of tomatoes are produced from the joints between the leaf and joints. Keep the ground free of weeds, and loosened with the hoe. In July the lower branches of fruit are well developed. I then top dress the soil with about three inches of well-decayed manure to conserve the plants.
