THE CAMPAIGN.

The federal campaign is now getting under way. Meetings will shortly be called and the candidates and their supporters will expound their views and their reasons for the faith that is in them. We feel assured that the great majority of our people desire a clean, honest canvas. Although political feeling occasionally becomes heated comparatively few of our people want deliberate misrepresentation or falsification. These means, unfortunately, sometimes succeed, at least once, but once discovered, they become ineffective on the principle that "a burned child shuns the fire."

Misrepresentations is at all times an evidence of weakness and our people have no appetite for misrepresentation on the vital questions now to be decided. The written policies of the three parties seeking the suffrage of the people are poles apart and involve the reversal or the retention of the fiscal policy which has made Canada what it is today. These policies may be glossed over by the politicians or by the party newspapers but the written word remains; the respective platforms agreed upon by the parties and to which the parties have pledged themselves, are in black and white, the three platforms have been published in The Guardian and in no other paper in the province. They speak for themselves and no matter what the respective candidates may say of their wisdom or unwisdom, if elected they will be guided by and will support the party and the platform to which they have pledged themselves---or they will separate themselves from the party. Let there be no misunderstanding on this point. Mr. MacKenzie King while professing to stand by the Liberal platform of 1919 disavowed his adherence to it. His candidates here must be more explicit, they must be either "on or off it." The Patriot also has pinned its faith to the 1919 platform and to Mr. MacKenzie King, a dual position which, if consistent, it cannot maintain. On all these matters and many others which will probably develop during the campaign the people have a right to demand directness and definiteness. As to the effect upon our markets and our future prospects they will have an opportunity to determine for themselves.

"THE DEADLY PARALLEL"

Under the caption "The Deadly Parallel," the Patriot unblushingly declares that conditions in the federal campaign are similar to those under which the last provincial campaign was fought in this province and that by the methods pursued in the winning of a victory for the Bell candidates a victory for the MacKenzie King candidates is assured.

This is at least candid. Fortunately for the people of this province the means by which the Bell government secured its ill gotten victory are well remembered and the results are still present with us. There need be no uncertainty or doubt upon the question.

The Bell candidates stumped the country with the charge of extravagance against the Arsenault government, with the charge of unnecessary taxation with a charge of an army of unnecessary officials and the promise to introduce economy to reduce taxation, to do away with unnecessary officials.

On these charges and these promises they secured their election and the Patriot without any remorse for the party's broken promises, boldly tells the people that the same methods will succeed in the federal campaign! And the Patriot and its chief Mr. MacKenzie King, are following

ing the course so "successfully" followed in the Bell campaign. Alleged extravagance on the part of the Meighen government, a promise to reduce taxation, a promise to disband surplus officials, a promise to enact a tariff that will benefit both consumer and producer, importer and exporter, employer and employee, these constitute the stock in trade of the MacKenzie King Liberals and they certainly constitute a "deadly parallel" with the methods which elected the Bell government in this province.

Our people are today reaping the fruits of their misplaced faith in Mr. Bell and his candidates. Their taxes instead of being reduced are quadrupled; instead of economy we have extravagance unbounded, instead of reduced officials we have a whole battalion of officials, instead of a government worthy of the people's confidence we have an aggregation in which the people have no confidence and which is just the kind of government to be expected, from the methods by which it came into power.

Now our people are forewarned; their credulity is again being appealed to; false promises are again being dangled before their eyes. Will they be deceived the second time?

DR. ROSS AND FREE TRADE.

We publish elsewhere a second letter from Dr. Ross. If his attitude on protection in his first letter was misinterpreted his stand on free trade in his letter this morning is quite clear: "Under existing conditions free trade cannot be obtained in Canada." In this he is at one with Premier Meighen who stated in his address in the Market Hall the other night that he would not be so much adverse to free trade if other countries would have it but that, as every other country in the world was protected it was necessary for Canada to be protected also. If Mr. MacKenzie King and Mr. Crear could be made to realize this the present campaign would be considerably simplified. With the doctor's proposed addition of an excise duty we have no objection except that its general application would be impracticable and that the tendency would be to increase the cost to the consumer. However the same idea is, as far as found practicable, carried out at present under what is called the sales tax, which is really an excise tax.

"A SORRY PERFORMANCE"

The Patriot described as "a sorry performance" the meetings addressed in Charlottetown by Premier Meighen. It also declared that the Conservatives in the city were "disappointed." This is a measure either of the Patriot's intelligence or its veracity and those who attended the meetings will judge for themselves. We are inclined to doubt its veracity. It required but little intelligence to listen to the comments of those present at these meetings, Liberals and Conservatives, to understand that far from being disappointed their highest anticipations, and they were very high, were fully realized. No one was disappointed in Mr. Meighen, except those who had hoped that at least somehow he would fall short of what his great reputation not only in Canada but in the British Empire had led the people of this province to expect of him. No one else was disappointed, on the contrary Mr. Meighen measured up to their most sanguine expectations and his meetings were most emphatically satisfactory.

Dr. Ross And Free Trade

Sir:---In your editorial comments on my letter of yesterday you are in error when you state that I am a strong believer in the principle of protection. In fact I am a strong believer in the principle of free trade. Owing to existing conditions I feel that free trade cannot obtain in Canada until now, therefore it is necessary to have a tariff of some sort. In adopting any sort of a tariff protection must result, and the protected interests are keen to take advantage of a measure designed for the safety of our country.

The object of my letter of yesterday was to point out a tariff scheme that would divert into the public treasury the money that now goes into the pockets of the manufacturers under either the Meighen tariff, the MacKenzie King tariff or even the Crear tariff. The scheme that I have outlined would, in my opinion do this. Under this scheme the manufacturers would have Canada to sell their goods in but Canada would get the fruits of the tariff and would then have a large fund to pay off our crushing debt.

To my mind any sort of tariff, no matter how great or how small is a tax on the consumer for the benefit of the manufacturer. It is true that competition tends to lessen the burden of the tax on the consumer. The competition among the manufacturers is done away with by mergers and trade arrangements among them. Why? So they can fleece the consumer to the full limit of the tariff. The consumer always must pay. He does not mind paying if money finds its way into the treasury of his country and not to swell the profits of the manufacturer who claims that what he wants is a tariff for is to enable him to have Canada as a field in which to sell his goods. He does not want money out of the tariff. Oh no! Well my scheme will give him the field, but no money which is all he states he wants. I may state here that I believe in paying the debt of Canada, but it does not follow that I consider the debt---and since---to be all justifiable. There, since---to be all

en in this province to show that the whole debt is not justifiable. Look around and see it has been incurred, however, and the devils who did it are concealed or unknown and Canada must pay the bill. I am Sir, etc. A. ROSS
