

Blueprint Program For Western Germany

LONDON, April 20—(AP)—Britain, the United States and France today blueprinted a pattern for restoring Western Germany's financial stability and giving it a government with a wide measure of self-control.

Official American observers were optimistic as they emerged from the first session of the current three-power talks on Germany.

The three powers adopted an agenda similar in broad outline to the one which served the first meeting a month ago. Russia was not invited to either session.

Major items for this meeting are the role of Germany in the European economy and control of the Ruhr; evolution of the political and economic organization of Germany; provisional territorial arrangements; security against German aggression.

Canada's Cows Working Over Time

OTTAWA, April 20—Canada's cows are cutting butter back on the kitchen table.

After five weeks of butter shortage, National Dairy Council officials today sighted relief for most parts of the Dominion.

From now until June, officials of the Council and of the Agriculture Department say, production will increase. In June, no part of Canada will be without adequate supplies.

This is being accomplished even with a noted drop in milk production and a continued overseas demand for Canadian cheese. Milk production had declined three per cent in the first three months of the year.

"Perhaps for this season," a dairy official said, "a drop in the price of butter should not be anticipated. In fact, the 21-per-cent freight increase granted railways has made it necessary to add a half-cent to the pound price."

In Ottawa there had been rumors that the retail price, now 72 and 73 cents, might be shaved to 67 and 68 cents by mid-May.

One oddity of the butter shortage is that Ontario and Quebec, whose normal production was about equal, would ship to the Maritimes—the hardest hit of all—and import butter from the Prairies, where supply is usually surplus to demand.

Win First Round In Bow And Arrow Bill

HALIFAX, April 20—The Nova Scotia Society for the Prevention of Cruelty, opposing a bill to create a special archery hunting licence, won the first phase of its case today.

The Nova Scotia Legislature's law amendments committee eliminated the archery section from proposed changes to the Hunting Act after hearing a delegation from the Society. It would have authorized a non-resident archery licence issued at \$5. Regular hunting fee is \$25.

The section can be replaced in the Legislature on a majority vote when the bill goes through second and third readings, but practice in the past has been to accept recommendations of the committee.

Gloom Dispelled On Stock Markets

A full month of steadily rising stock market prices had dispelled the heavy gloom that prevailed in financial circles only two or three months ago.

The sharp break in the commodity markets of last February brought in its wake the fear that a downward price adjustment — which was generally considered inevitable and food for the economy — might very well snowball into a session of economic recession. Reports spread that consumers were holding back to wait for further price drops; retailers were said to be re-stocking on a day-to-day basis; some sections of industry were beginning to inventory special reserves for inventory depreciations.

The price structure, however, did not break. Commodity prices held at the lower levels established mid-February and even the securities market, long in a special depression of its own, began to show firmer tendencies.

The Wall Street Journal reports that the record 17 1-2 cents a

share for lead put into effect two weeks ago already has begun to attract large tonnages of foreign metal. Within that period Canadian base metal mining stocks have shown market price increases.
