A NEW UNSINKABLE SHIP INVENTED.

Floaters Constructed that Will Keep a Ship Afloat With Large Holes in Main Hull.

Of the many problems which for ages have baffled the inventive genius of man, that of the construction of a vessel which will not sink is one of the most important. Such an invention would mean actually the saving of thousands of lives and millions of property, aside from the fact that it would despoil Old Neptune of many of his terrors. No one realized this more vividly than the heirs of the drowned millionaire Anthony Pollock, who years ago offered a large reward for the solution of the seemingly unsolvable problem.

And now two young Frenchmen, Messieurs Paul Manchin and Louis Bon-dreux, have constructed a model of a vessel which, it is confidently asserted, cannot sink. In the science—or "art" of naval architecture this is something new, most other inventors' chief aim having been the devising of effective escape for passengers and crew in case it became necessary to leave the ship.

And in all other respects, except for the fact that they have given a wider application to the principles already demonstrated effective, i. e., the division of a vessel into different compartments, by waterproof partitions—they have struck out on new and hitherto unexplored lines.

In the model which they have constructed there are located in the interior of the ship two rows of big iron water-

proof tanks, which are to keep the vessel floating after a collision. These "floaters" do not quite reach the vessel's bottom, and between them and the side walls there is a space of about four yards.

If the ship were to run against a hidden sandbank or rock, the floaters would remain intact and undamaged, even if large holes were torn in the main hull. The dimensions of the floaters, as well as their number, are so proportionate that even should the water penetrate into other compartments of the ship the bulk would still remain floating, with the upper deck and the roofs of the flares above the water.

And even granting that one of the floaters should be destroyed—something highly improbable—the rest of them would still keep the vessel afloat. It would, of course, be necessary under the circumstances that the exit from the top. The model of the invention is so constructed that by means of a rope, which only requires to be pulled, the inventors are enabled to create openings in the side walls.

No matter how rapidly the water was allowed to flow in, the model never sank beyond a certain depth, when placed on exhibition recently. Scientists and experts who have inspected the model say that the inventors have apparently solved the problem—at least in theory. But some of them are skeptical as to the practical value of the invention.

PHOTOGRAPHIC COMPETITION PRIZES AWARDED

The Island Scenery Receives Consideration at the Hands of the Judges.

At eight o'clock yesterday morning the Judges in the Y. M. C. A. photographic competition met and awarded the prizes. In the general competition first prize a handsome silver medal presented by Coun. Paton was won by C. Houseman of Halifax, his view representing Prince's Lodge, Bedford Basin, near Halifax. This scene is beautifully executed the water, land and cloud effects combine to make a picture of rare excellence.

The second prize a bronze medal, presented by W. S. Louison, falls to A. G. Peasey of Toronto. The picture represents the entrance to a Cathedral and is almost perfect in every detail.

The third prize, a camera, presented by Johnson & Johnson has been awarded to Harry Weeks of this city for his picture A Shady Nook in the Morrell River. The view shows artistic ability on the part of the photographer.

In the special class of Genre work the prize a silver medal, presented by G. H. Cook was easily won by F. R. Lookhart of the Toronto Camera Club. The picture is called *Ceiling Up* and represents a scene in a basement with a boy in the act of putting coal in the furnace, his sister stands beside an interesting spectator. Their faces are illumined by the glare from the open door of the furnace. This picture will be hard to excel.

Of the prizes for P. E. Island competitors Miss Frances Johnson receives the first, a silver medal presented by J. S. Beyer. Her views represent a scene on a winter River, Miss Johnson is an enthusiastic amateur photographer and deserves credit for the excellence of her work.

The second prize, one year's subscription to the Photographic Times Journal, presented by the publishers is won by Chas. S. Drew of Charlottetown. His picture was taken at Rocky Point showing the Cliff rising up in the foreground with the block house light in the distance. The exhibit will be continued throughout to-day and evening and should be seen by every lover of the beautiful. The admission fee of five cents is merely nominal. The pictures will be sold, the proceeds are for the Y. M. C. A.

THE GREAT COAL STRIKE.

WILKESBARE, Pa., July 27.—The beginning of the eleventh week of the anthracite miners' strike finds apparently no change in the situation although the rumor has been revived that an effort will be made some day this week upon the part of one of the large companies to start up one of their collieries.
