Livers, Tongues, Etc. Now Ceilings

A change in the effective date of the order fixing maximum prices on fancy meats and meat by-products, was announced yesterday by Mr. Ewen M. Nicholson, Prices and Supply Representative of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board. The order will go into effect Monday next, August 23, and not August 16 as previously announced.

Maximum prices at which various fancy meats and by-products of beef, veal, lamb and mutton may be sold in all parts of Canada are fixed in the order. Fancy meats and by-products covered by the order are liver, hearts, tongues, sweetbreads, kidneys, brains, fries, heads, feet, tails and tripe.

Specific maximum wholesale prices in cents per pound are set out for each of these items in each of the 15 zones across Canada. To his laid down cost a retailer is permitted to add his customary basic period mark-up which must not in any case exceed 30 per cent of his selling price.

A proviso requires wholesalers equitably to distribute their available supplies of fancy meats and by-products among their customers.

BLUEBERRY CROP

In rural areas of the province the picking of the blueberry crop, which grows wild, is underway. Prices are unusually high, wild pickers receiving eight cents per pound for their product. Before the war prices were as low as one and a half cents per pound. The crop varies from fair to considerably below average. In some districts late frost destroyed a portion of the bloom and reduced the yield. Wild raspberries too, are only a fair crop in most districts with some sections reporting an unusually small yield. Few raspberries are offered for sale but from one section the price to the pickers is reported to be 59 cents per quart.

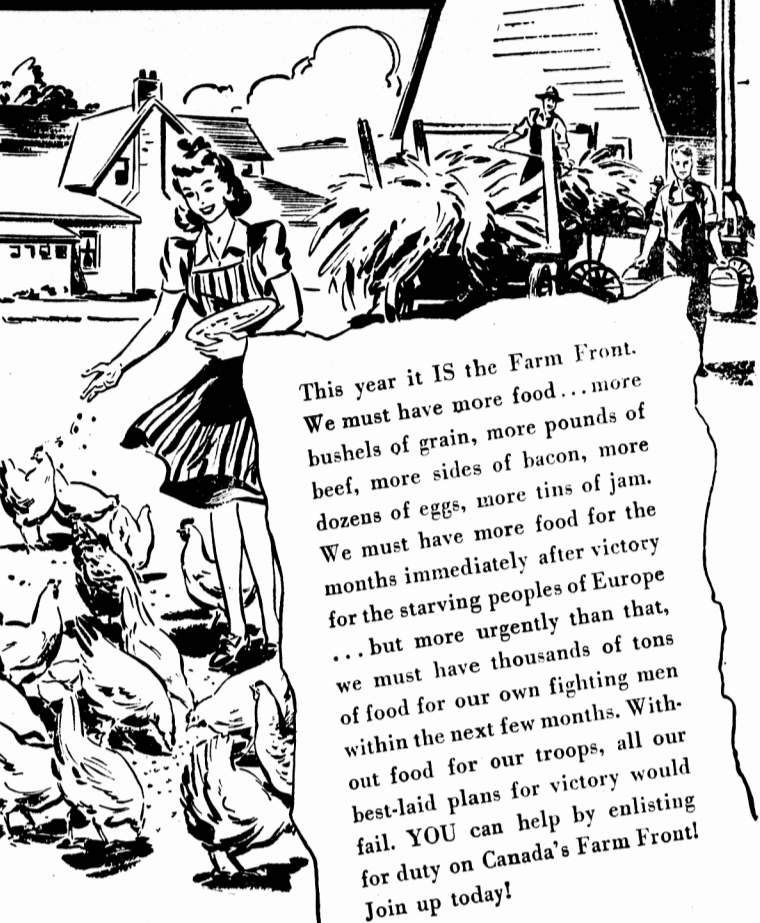
ENTERTAIN VISITOR

Rental Notice Now Revised

"Roomers and boarders are brought under the price ceiling in the new rentals order of the Wartime Prices and Trade Board which, among other things, reduces the minimum one year's notice to vacate to six months; landlords and tenants in Prince Edward Island are reminded by Mr. Ewen M. Nicholson, Prices and Supply representative. Designed to make easier the part of tenants and landlords, the order provides that tenants may be dispossessed for three reasons: personal occupancy by the landlord or members of his immediate family; a division of the accommodation so it will house more people and where they or their subtenants are obnoxious. Thirteen specified circumstances permitting the landlord to proceed in eviction according to provincial law are listed in the order. Under the revised order it is provided that an application for an increase in rent is generally limited to situations where the tenant is receiving more value for his rent than he was on the basic date. Persons on a weekly tenancy of self-contained units are not given the same protection as those on monthly or yearly tenancies. The order authorizes appointments of "Local Rentals Appraisers" who are authorized to deal with applications for changes in rent. Applications for increases of maximum rental may be made if the rental of any unit in a multiple family dwelling is less than the rental generally prevailing for similar units in the same building if the landlord spends 10 per cent or more of the assessed accommodations for renovations. These are but a few of the high lights of the revised order.
