AWNINGS HELP TO COOL HOMES

"Look here: what's been happening to-night? You were okay when you went away from here," he asked anxiously.

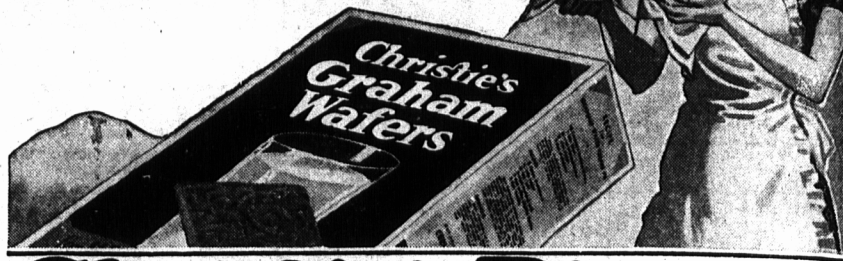

THE COOK'S CORNER

EGGS WITH ENGLISH PEAS 3 slices fresh bread 2 lbs. fresh peas 1 tablespoon flour 2 tablespoons butter 2 cups boiling water 1-2 teaspoon salt 1 tablet of sugar 1 small onion, chopped 4 eggs, well beaten

Cut bread into small star shapes and toast or saute in a little butter until brown. Keep hot. Shell and wash peas well. Drain and toss with flour. Add butter and water and cook over moderate heat, stirring constantly until just thickened. Remove from heat, turn into serving dish and garnish with stars. Approximate yield: 4 portions.

PLANKED EGGS, HOLLANDAISE 1 egg plant 1-4 cup butter 6 poached eggs Salt Pepper 1-2 lb. bacon, broiled Hollandaise Sauce

Wash and peel eggplant. Cut in slices 3/4 inch thick. Cover with cold salted water, weigh down with a plate and let stand three hours. Drain and dry carefully.

Saute in butter until tender on both sides. Top with poached egg, season, and garnish with crisp bacon. Serve with hollandaise.

NEVERFAIL HOLLANDAISE 1-2 cup butter 4 egg yolks 2 tablespoons lemon juice 1-2 teaspoon salt Dash of cayenne 1-3 cup boiling water Cream butter and add egg yolks one at a time, beating until blended after each addition. Add lemon juice and seasonings, beating well. Place over hot water, add boiling water slowly, stirring until blended. Then beat with rotary beater until thick and smooth, like soft custard. Approximate yield: 1-4 cup sauce.

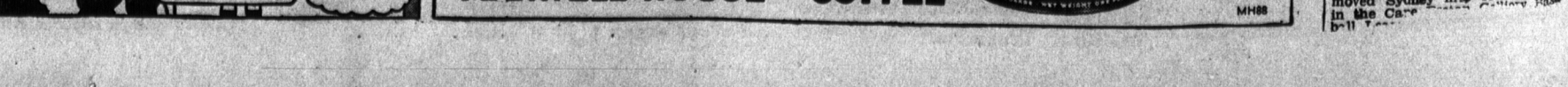
