OTTAWA, September 30.—Interest in Government circles is directed toward the growing list of vacancies which Premier R. B. Bennett and his ministerial colleagues have before them. A Finance Minister, and a deputy Minister for the same department, a tariff board, in all probability a royal commission to go into the railway situation, a Lieutenant-Governor for the province of Nova Scotia—these are some of the appointments which the Government is expected to make before long. Senate and judicial vacancies also exist, and there are a number of important posts in the Civil Service opening up as higher officials retire for a rest after their labors.

That a Minister of Finance will be appointed before the opening of the next session of Parliament is taken for granted in view of statements made by Premier Bennett in the House of Commons at the last session. Then the Prime Minister said that he did not expect to introduce another budget. This would be left to his successor in the finance portfolio. No indication has yet been given, however, of the man who will be asked to take over what is regarded as one of the most important departments of Government. Mr. Bennett has carried it along, and continues to administer it during these times of financial disturbance.

Parliament passed legislation at the last session which provides for a tariff board. Through the storm and stress of opposition the Government obtained parliamentary approval of a ten-year term for the new body. It is to consist of three members, of which one is to be chairman. The board is yet to be appointed and again there is no indication of its personnel. It has been suggested that the chairman may be chosen from the judiciary but this has no official confirmation. The board is to be a fact-finding body, and its findings will form a basis for fixing tariffs.

Appointment of a royal commission on railways was endorsed by a parliamentary committee which went into the Canadian National estimates, at the last session of Parliament. The suggestion of a royal commission, which appeared to meet with general approval from the railways as well as from others interested in transportation problems, has, it is understood, been occupying the attention of the Government for some little time. While no official announcement has been made, it appears probable that within a few weeks the Government will select its personnel. The railway problem is regarded as one of the most serious before Canada at present.

FLYER COMPLETES 10,000TH HOUR

DALLAS, Sept. 30, (U.P.)—Herbert L. Kindred flew his 10,000th air hour the other day on his regular run between Dallas and Atlanta for American Airways. Kindred, who has flown every inaugural flight out of Texas, never has had a serious accident.

HOLDRIDGE, Neb., Sept. 30, (U.P.)—Nebraska's deepest test oil well has been abandoned. The well was drilled 5,678 feet at a cost of \$81,000, without locating oil. No producing well has ever been found in the state.

TURKEYS TO BE BRANDED

FLORENCE, Colo., Sept. 30, (U.P.)—All turkeys look alike, even to the growers, and marking the birds to keep the flocks separated has proven to be a serious problem. Demonstrators have hit upon the plan of tattooing the turkeys with designs similar to those used in branding cattle. The turkey-brand is registered with the Bureau of Markets as is the cattle brand, and
