### FRANCES WILLARD'S MESSAGE TODAY

"America's womanhood holds the key to moral victory," is the living message Frances E. Willard is bringing to us. "Lo, the whole broad continent is ours," is the thought that sings itself into our hearts as lovingly we continue to respond to her far-reaching urgings.

Frances E. Willard was a patriotic seer and an ardent lover and friend of humanity. With wide vision, daring faith and invincible courage, she rallied and organized for the mighty struggle against the legalized liquor traffic, the women of the home, the church, the school, the college, the farm and the business world, that victoriously culminated in the passage of the Eighteenth Amendment to the constitution of the United States of America—one of the greatest moral and social triumphs of history. Today the heritage of a host of women, ten million strong, the W.C.T.U. and co-operating societies, is the constructive, compelling task of fulfilling Frances Willard's heavenly vision.

### To Save Lives In Front Line Warship at Sea Was Startling

WINNIPEG, Sept. 29.—(CP)—The North Atlantic is not the most pleasant place to be when war breaks out but Miss Frances van Engel of Winnipeg doesn't think it was so bad. She was aboard the Holland-American liner Veendam when the announcement came through that Great Britain and France had declared war on Germany. The Veendam was then four nights out from Rotterdam on its way to New York.

"We were going to have a masquerade that night," she said. "Some of the passengers thought we ought to be more sober and call it off, but we had it anyway."

Two nights from New York a warship was sighted. "I guess it must have been an American ship because nothing happened, but it was a sinister sight in the moonlight. We were startled for a minute but I don't think anyone was really afraid."

Miss van Engel said there were more than 200 extra passengers on the ship. Baggage was placed in all corridors because there was no room in the cabins after passengers had doubled up to make room. Some of the passengers who paid first-class passages had to sleep on mattresses on the floor of the cockpit bar.

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### P. E. Island Hospital Annual Collection

The Prince Edward Island Hospital is appealing to the public again for financial assistance. The department which was organized about three years ago at a cost of \$6000 is proving a great aid to the doctors in their treatment of cancer and other diseases. Over 150 cases have been treated during that time with almost marvelous results in a few cases and a great relief to many others.

The Trustees are only now finding out that the upkeep of this machine is going to be a greater burden financially than was expected. Already one Coolidge tube has to be replaced, the new tube costing \$300.

### Courage Needed In War Demands

WINNIPEG, Sept. 29.—(CP)—Steadfastness and courage are a vital need for the women of Canada in wartime. Alderman (Mrs.) R. F. McWilliams told members of the Greater Winnipeg Women's Liberal Association at the annual fall meeting.

"It is essential to understand and keep in mind why we are at war," said Mrs. McWilliams. "Our enemy is the evil force of Hitlerism."

She asked the women to wait for direction and to stand in readiness to serve "our country in war" and to "trust our leaders and men."

Endurance, steadfastness and unwavering courage were three requisites which would be of material help in the war.

"We must organize ourselves for a long war. Try to have this attitude: 'Here I am, I am ready, I am calm and self-controlled,'" Mrs. McWilliams said.

"We must remember that there are thousands of loyal German citizens in Canada, it is not they who are our enemies, it is the destructive, evil forces of Hitlerism."

# CIVIC TAXES

All taxpayers who received a statement of arrears of City Taxes issued by the External Auditors, or by the City Collector, and who wish to file any objection to the amounts as shown owing, are hereby advised that by authority of an Order in Council of the Provincial Government the undernamed have been appointed to constitute a Civic Tax Adjustment Board

This Board has authority by reason of the said Order in Council to:

- (1) Write off any tax, or assessment which it may decide has already been paid, or has been wrongfully levied.
- (2) Refer to the Regular City Tax Appeal Board for confirmation or reduction in valuation any assessment levied against any taxpayer who may have been dissuaded from timely appeal by any action of any civic official as by way of any reduction accepted in good faith.
- (3) Confirm all taxes or assessments as shown on statements aforementioned when such amounts are decided by the Board to be correct, or when no objection is presented.

## IMPORTANT

All taxpayers desiring to have objections heard by the Board must file notice of intention to appeal with the City Clerk on or before

OCTOBER 7th, 1939

otherwise the objection will not be entertained unless it can be shown that the want of notice was due to absence or illness.

All objections will be considered by the Board without costs to or for the taxpayer irrespective of the result of the appeal, without any unnecessary publicity or delay.

Taxpayers filing notice of intention to appeal will be notified by the City Clerk or by public advertisement as to the date upon which their objection will be considered by the Board.
