ELECTRIC LIGHTS AT FALCONWOOD.

The installation of electric lighting at the Falconwood Hospital will go far to relieve the serious concern that has long existed in many minds as to the danger to the inmates from fire.

Mr. Doull in presenting to the Government on Thursday night the fine new electrolier for the Hall at the Hospital, brought vividly to the remembrance of many a fire which occurred in the same spot only a few years ago on the occasion of a public entertainment, which caused much alarm at the time, but fortunately was not attended with any loss of life.

Indeed it speaks well for the carefulness of those in charge as well as their good fortune, that some disaster by fire has not occurred at the Hospital. We almost feared to speak of it until the danger was in great measure removed as it has been. The utter helplessness of the inmates in case of danger, and the constant impingement of danger from the hundreds of lamps and lanterns in use by night, all went to show that some other method of lighting the institution had become imperative.

Another interesting feature of the installation of an independent system of electric lighting at Falconwood, and which was remarked upon by several speakers, is the information it will supply as to the desirability of a municipal lighting plant for the city. That subject has been much discussed and will come up again some years hence. In the meantime the electric plant at Falconwood will furnish a good deal of specific information not hitherto available.

THE POTATO QUESTION.

In an article on the potato question in The Maritime Farmer Father Burke remarks in concluding:

"In any case, we think the Department of Agriculture here, should take up this matter at once and see that reliable seed of the required varieties be obtainable by farmers next spring. Every farmer who raises potatoes to sell should get into a quantity of such kinds as Green Mountain, Dakota Red, Empire State, Chili, etc., without delay."

From this it would appear that others besides The Guardian consider it a proper function for the Agricultural Department of the Province to lead the way in the introduction of new and desirable seed. No doubt the head of that Department has his own ideas of what is best, and our suggestions are always offered in the most friendly spirit. It is not suggested that the seed be distributed free, but it would seem that the Department should be able to procure seed at a more reasonable figure in quantity than it could be procured by individuals.

In the hurry of making up the Magazine page of today's Guardian, the paragraph relating to the City Recorder was not placed beneath the engraving of The City Council which there appears. This important position at the Board is filled by Hon. F. L. Hazard, K. C. senior member of the legal firm of Hazard & Gaudet. Mr. Hazard has occupied the office of Recorder since December 1893, during which time the legal business of the City has been in most capable hands.

DOG-FISH AND SHARKS A BOTHER

WASHINGTON, March, 8.—The ravages of the dogfish and shark among the fisheries of Massachusetts was discussed by the president today with the committee appointed by the governor of Massachusetts to come here for the purpose. The sharks and dogfish are destroying great number of fish, the ravages being so extensive as to effect the fishing industry, especially mackerel and cod. There is a bill before congress which has for its object the promotion of certain industries that make use of the shark and dogfish.

BRITISH COMMONS WANT PAY.

The British Parliament, which has long been considered the greatest and weightiest deliberative assembly in the world, has enjoyed the further distinction that the members of both Houses have served from time immemorial without pay. The example of the Mother Country in this regard has not been followed in the Colonies or the United States; for outside of the United Kingdom in all English-speaking countries and most other countries having representative institutions the rule is to indemnify the members for the time given to the country's service.

Britain is likely hereafter to adopt the indemnity plan. The other day in the House of Commons a motion passed by 238 majority to pay each member of Parliament \$1500 yearly. This motion was introduced by a private member to test the opinion of the House, but can have no effect until it is taken up by the Government, which must initiate and become responsible for all money appropriations. This Premier Campbell-Bannerman says the Government has neither the time nor the money to do at present. But there is little doubt that the time is near at hand when members of the Imperial Parliament will be paid.

For hundreds of years very few outside the wealthy classes sought to be elected and still fewer were elected to Parliament. But by the great extension of the franchise this has been materially changed. Many gifted Irishmen without wealth have obtained seats, and have supported themselves by various means, or have been assisted by friends at home. Now to these has been added some fifty representatives of labor, most of whom are being paid by the local trades unions in their constituencies. All these naturally desire the introduction of the indemnity system. And fairminded men of wealth recognise the desirability of this change.

It was a wealthy English Liberal capitalist, W. H. Lever, who introduced the motion in favor of paying members, which was carried by so large a majority as above referred to. This he did, not on account of himself or his class to whom an indemnity of \$1,500 yearly would be of small consequence, but in a spirit of fairness to the great majority of the people who desire to be represented by intelligent men of their own station in life, who could not afford to attend the long sessions without some settled means of support. It may be years before the payment of members goes into effect. The Lords may oppose and a feat the measure where the Government takes it up. But there can be little doubt of its ultimate adoption.

Our present King when he was Prince of Wales, in 1890 visited Canada, laid the corner stone of the Parliament Buildings at Ottawa and opened the Victoria Bridge at Montreal, then one of the greatest bridges in the world. Canada has now another bridge approaching completion across the St. Lawrence near Quebec. It possesses several unique features, among them being the longest single span which has been constructed. It is proposed that Parliament shall by joint address invite the King and Queen to visit the Dominion and formally open the new bridge. Should this be done and the invitation accepted it would be a source of patriotic satisfaction to the Canadian people. At this writing we cannot offer an opinion as to the chances of the much desired royal visit taking place.

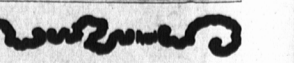

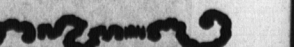
