THIRTYEIGHT POUND FISH - Mr. D. J. Kennedy of Detroit, Michigan, who is spending a holiday in Prince Edward Island where he was born, motored to Alberton last Monday accompanied by his nephews Dr. Charles Kennedy of New York, and Mr. Samuel Kennedy of this city, and their wives. Another nephew, Mr. J. D. Kennedy of O'Leary had arranged a codfishing trip for the party which left Alberton Tuesday morning. The trip was a very successful one, the older Mr. Kennedy who is eighty years young, capturing quite a number of large cod, the largest of which tipped the scale at 38 pounds. In order that there should be no doubt about this fish Mr. Kennedy brought it with him to Charlottetown where it was on exhibition yesterday at the Russ Hotel.

PLEADED GUILTY. London, Ont., Aug. 5. - Leslie Hathway pleaded guilty to robbing the Bank of Montreal at Thorndale on July 3 when he appeared before Deputy Magistrate Gladman in police court today. The total amount, \$5,800, stolen in the single-handed holdup, has been returned to the bank. Sentence was deferred until Thursday.

ANGLO-JAPANESE TRADE TREATY. London, Aug. 5. - Baron Hayashi Japanese ambassador, and Foreign Secretary Chamberlain yesterday signed a new Anglo-Japanese treaty regarding trade and navigation. The new agreement modifies an existing commercial treaty, and is understood to be without political significance.

UNITED SUPPORT PROMISED BUY-IN-CANADA MOVEMENT. Montreal, Aug. 5. - Unequivocal support for a "Buy-in-Canada" movement that will be extended from coast to coast was voiced today at a representative meeting of bankers, brokers, bond dealers and transportation companies.

DEMPEY AND KEARNS SPLIT. Los Angeles, Aug. 5. - Rob Roy Benton, who said he was speaking for Jack Dempsey, announced yesterday that the real estate holding of the heavyweight boxing champion and his manager has been divided and an agreement reached, insuring Jack Kearns his split of the profits of any Dempsey bout prior to September, 1928. The announcement followed conferences between Dempsey and Kearns.

Whether there will be any Dempsey bout prior to September of next year, however, remains to be seen, Benton said, explaining that nothing has been done about the proposed bout at Michigan City, Ind., next September.

"Dempsey has not signed to fight Greb at Michigan City and does not intend to," added the champion's spokesman. "No articles were sent to him to sign nothing definite was done about the proposed Greb match, and as a result Dempsey has decided that if he fights anyone at all, in September it will not be Greb."

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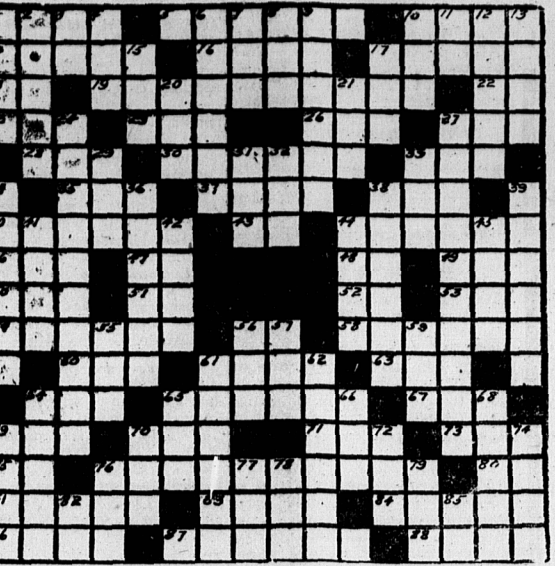
