Americans Whip Detroit 3-2; Are In Fifth Position

DETROIT, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Brooklyn Americans lined up first place in the National Hockey League by defeating Detroit Red Wings with a 3-2 victory before 7,847 spectators in an afternoon game today. The Americans exploded with three second-period goals to gain an insurmountable margin although Detroit attacked almost constantly in the last period. Harry Watson scored two goals to lead the Brooklyn surge and rookie Joe Krol and defenseman Will Field and Tommy Anderson bagged the others. Murray Armstrong drew three assists. Mud Bruneteau put Detroit in front in the first period with his first of his two goals but Watson tied it up less than half a minute later and Brooklyn made sure of victory in the second period. The other Detroit goal was produced by Don Grosso. The Red Wings, who in their last home appearance had blanked Montreal Canadiens 10-0, yielded the largest number of goals scored against them here this season.

Bruins Defeat Chihawks 4-3 To Retain 1st Place

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Boston Bruins defeated Chicago Black Hawks 4-3 tonight to retain their lead in the National Hockey League race. The game was witnessed by 18,146 spectators. The only penalty was called against Harvey Jackson of the Bruins after nine minutes of the third period. The teams manoeuvred on even terms most of the way, with the Bruins holding a one point edge at each intermission. They led 2-1 after the first period and 3-2 after the second. They went ahead 4-2 in the third frame but the Hawks came back with their third goal, and then tried frantically to tie the score. Woody Dumart, assisted by Bobby Baser and Mill Schmidt, sent the Bruins ahead after 13:30 minutes of the first period had elapsed, and the Hawks never caught up. Harvey Jackson made Boston's lead 2-0 at 15:34 when he took a pass from Herb Cain, and Max Bentley's counter for Chicago at 18:55 left the Hawks a point ahead at the end of the opening period. On an unassisted scoring play, Bauer tallied for Boston 3:36 of the second period, but this was

matched by Red Hamill's goal for Chicago at 17:04. Harvey Jackson's second goal put Boston ahead, 4-2, at 6:42, and the Hawks didn't get it back until 10:45 when Max Bentley connected. The Boston defences functioned well the remainder of the game to keep the hard-pressing Hawks in check.

Plan to play More tennis

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(AP)—The United States Lawn Tennis Association Saturday announced plans for more tennis than the country has played previously, outlined its 1942 tournament program and disciplined some of its amateur stars and member clubs for excessive expense accounts last year. President Malcolm Ward, who was re-elected, told the annual convention of the association that more tournaments and fewer exhibitions would be sanctioned in 1942, the meeting approved dates for 10 national tournaments topped by the combined national singles and doubles championships at Forest Hills Aug. 27. Accepting a report of the amateur rule committee, the convention spanked three of its leading stars, Frank Parker, Fred Schroeder and Jack Kramer, for evading the rules covering expense accounts at eastern tournaments last season.

Bracken Comments On New Federal Financial Scheme

WINNIPEG, Jan. 18.—(CP)—Premier John Bracken of Manitoba said in a statement today that although accepted as part of Manitoba's contribution to the war effort, terms of the agreement announced by Finance Minister Ilsley are not regarded by the Manitoba government as a solution to problems this province raised before the Rowell-Sirois commission on dominion-provincial relations. Mr. Ilsley, in announcing annual payments to be made to provinces willing to vacate the field of personal income and corporation taxation for duration of the war and a year after, said last night Manitoba would receive \$5,624,740. "The press report is literally correct," Mr. Bracken stated, "but the millions of dollars quoted as being paid to the provinces leaves an impression of generosity which is not warranted by the facts. As to its effects on the provincial finances of Manitoba these may be stated very briefly. The \$5,624,740-odd it pays in lieu of income and corporation taxes is by government's grant recommended by the Sirois report and only about one-seventh of the assistance that would have come to Manitoba and its municipalities had that report been implemented."

Hawks dump Leafs 3-2

TORONTO, Jan. 18.—(CP)—Chicago Black Hawks, who have been fattening up at the expense of the clubs below them in recent National Hockey League games, found the second-place Toronto Maple Leafs just as easy to beat Saturday night. The Hawks, outfighting and outsmarting the Leafs at every turn, scored a 4-2 victory to advance to within four peris of second spot in the league standing. Bill Carse, older of the two Edmonton brothers playing with the Black Hawks, provided the winning margin for his club by bagging a brace of counters. Cully Dahlstrom and Bill Thoms got the other Chicago tallies. Lenky Hank Goldup, whose scoring guns have been spiked recently, boomed forth long enough to pick off both the Toronto goals to get the nod over his linemates, Pete Langelle and Johnny McCreedy, for the starring role. Turk Broda furnished a sustained two-minute acrobatic performance in the Toronto nets early in the second before he yielded to Dahlstrom for the goal that gave Chicago a lead that was never lost.

Rangers Win In Overtime From Canadiens 5-4 To Split Weekend Series

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(CP)—New York Rangers, coming from behind a three-goal deficit, tonight defeated a fast, aggressive Montreal Canadiens team 5-4 in overtime to gain revenge for the 6-2 defeat they suffered in a National Hockey League game in Montreal Saturday night. Canadiens, needing a victory in their fight for sixth place, flattered in three goals in seven minutes of the second period and led 4-2 when the period ended. But in the third period Rangers turned loose one of the most powerful attacks they have staged in their long and hard drive to the league's second place and tied the score. Then in the overtime they scored the winning goal, through Lynn Patrick on one of the clever passing plays for which they are noted throughout the circuit. Neil Colville intercepted a Canadian pass, flicked the puck to Bryan Hextall, and the winger, six or eight feet in front of the net, then slid him the puck, and Hextall had no chance on the short, sharp shot.

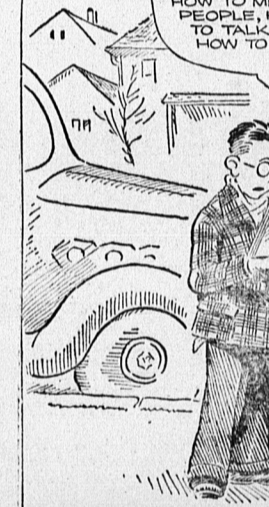

DiMag' voted Player of year

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—(AP)—Joseph Paul DiMaggio, the great centerfielder of New York Yankees and last season's MVP, was named today by New York Baseball Writers as their choice for the "player of the year" award to be presented at their annual dinner Feb. 1. It was the second time in five years that the honor had been won by "Jabbo" Joe. The 56-game hitting streak of the slugger from San Francisco was an outstanding feat of the 1941 season, breaking a 44-year-old major league record and propelling the Yankees to their fifth pennant in six years. Selection of DiMaggio was unanimous, although the writers were confronted with a difficult choice because of the prowess shown by Ted Williams of Boston Red Sox in capturing the American League batting championship with a .406 average.

Nelson captures Oakland open

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 18.—(AP)—Byron Nelson of Toledo, Ohio, won the \$5,000 Oakland Open Golf Tournament with a 72-hole total of 274. He posted a 22-37 even on the final round to maintain a sub-par pace throughout the event. The winner, taking \$1,020 as his share, carded rounds of 67-68-69 on his other rounds, over the Sequoyan Course.

A lucky goal 30 seconds before the end of regular time gave the Pats a 1-0 draw with Paul Hayes' Canadiens in the other half of the win bill. 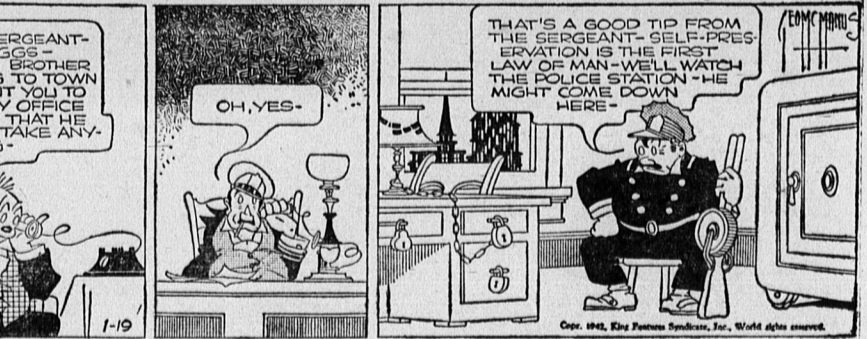
