Stocks Lower In Dull Market

NEW YORK, Aug. 30—Stocks dragged lower today in a rather uninteresting market. Wheat, on the other hand, rallied vigorously after an early sag; its recovery served to check the downward swing in shares during the last hour, but the list slipped again at the close and net losses of a point or more were numerous.

Trade statistics coming to hand at midweek served to emphasize the previously apparent seasonal contraction in industry. Mining shares, stimulated yesterday by President Roosevelt's gold order, appeared to have discounted the prospective improvement in earnings as a result of better selling prices; they met considerable profit-taking and finished with numerous losses of a point or so.

With the market facing a three-day vacation, traders seemed willing to close out commitments and reluctant to acquire new lines, hence prices receded easily under moderate pressure. Transactions, on the whole, appeared professional and routine, the trend being readily influenced by orders either way, as was the case in wheat. A round mid-afternoon cotton had a flurry when a rumor of imminent Russian recognition was floated, but that commodity was off 65 to 95 cents a bale net. Stock sales totalled 2,170,170 shares.

Oil equities were fairly firm as the industry's code date approached. Utilities also braced a bit, but rails and industrials were sluggish. Washington's repeal vote, like Missouri's, found the wet issue indifferently.

Steel production, said "Iron age" has gone to a 47 percent rate from 50, and there is no suggestion of a trend reversal "outside of a seasonal upturn in automobile production." Much of the recessions of the review pointed out, is attributable to uncertainties over N. R. A. readjustments; also, consumers are apparently well stocked. Shares representing the industry, including U. S. Steel and Bethlehem, were mildly reactionary. Consolidated Gas was firm to the close.

American Can, General Electric, American Telephone, Du Pont, Chrysler, Sears Roebuck, National Biscuit, Sears Roebuck, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, New York Central, Baltimore and Ohio and Western Union were down 1 to 2. Allied Chemical reduced a loss of more than 5 points to 3 1-4 net. Homestake mining dropped 21 points, then rallied to close 6 lower. Looking to foreign exchanges for possible repercussions from the new gold order, it was obvious that operators were somewhat uncertain. The dollar had a fair rally in the morning, then tended toward narrow movements; yesterday, talk of a "free gold market" brought a late reaction in United States currency. Pending the expected treasury's regulations governing controlled sale of newly mined gold, the market decided to go slowly. Money weakened. The stock exchange posted a record-low call loan renewal rate of 3-4 of one percent, thus breaking with the one percent figure which had been figured as artificial in view of general conditions in credit markets. Funds were unavailable unofficially at half of one percent. Late in the trading day bankers' acceptance rates were cut another eighth, reflecting a stronger investment demand and reduction in yields through purchases by the reserve system.
