Mrs. Dr. Collins who has been visiting in town has returned to Vernon River.

ALEXANDRIA DIVISION, No. 242, Stanley Bridge has had the lodge rooms placed in first class order.

A. A. McDonald, Murray River has sold out to his business, T. L. Cook and his house to Dr. Brehaut.

Mrs. D. F. Kennedy, who has been residing for some time with her daughter Mrs. Carl Owen at Bristol, Virginia, returned last week to Georgetown.

Dr. J. A. Murray, Halifax, who just graduated from Dalhousie university in medicine, has been appointed to the position of surgeon to the admiralty surveying vessel "Elinor."

PHOENIX W., the great pacing gelding to be lotteried at St. John on May 23rd, is rapidly getting put in shape for the racing season by Mr. Fowler, the man who drove the horse when he broke the Maritime record at Chatham.

The baccalaureate sermon of Acad in University on Sunday, June 4th, will be preached by the Rev. W. E. Bates, formerly of Halifax and Amherst, now of Mystic, Conn. In the evening the Rev. E. E. Daly, of Bridgetown, will deliver an address to the College Young Men's Association.

A number of Methodist ministers of Nova Scotia, who sought transfer to the west, have been disappointed in not securing the desired change. The demand is for young men, and not men with families. The Rev. A. S. Tuttle was the only man transferred from Nova Scotia this year. Mr. Tuttle is finishing his course at Mount Allison University.

At a meeting held April 23rd of the corporation of McGill University it was announced that, as Laval University had not sent up a candidate, the appointment to the Province of Quebec, the scholarship for 1905 had been placed in the hands of the McGill corporation. In addition to the two now completing their first year of residence at Oxford, a third Rhodes scholar from McGill University will thus go into residence the coming Autumn. Montreal Witness.

With regard to the running of the I. C. R. trains a rumor is current on the Mainland that the night train between Halifax and St. John will be discontinued when the summer time table comes in next June and that the Maritime Express will do the same work leaving Halifax about 7:30 p. m. and at Moncton connect with a special for St. John. For the accommodation of the travelling public it is expected that a special sleeper for St. John and intermediate stations will be attached to the Maritime. This will save the I. C. R. one train each day.

REGARDING the probability of the merger of the Merchants Bank of Canada and the Royal Bank of Canada going through, a director of the Merchants, who was present when the probable terms of the merger were discussed says to the Montreal Herald: "The exact situation at present makes it very doubtful whether the merger will go through at all. Some had hoped that it would go through before the annual meeting of the Merchants Bank in June, but so far the representatives of the two banks have not arrived at any thing like a satisfactory basis. While it might be a good thing if the merger were put through the two banks seem too well satisfied with their present positions to be willing to yield to the terms of the other proposals. I do not think the Royal Bank is big enough to buy out the Merchants, and while the Merchants are in a position to buy out the Royal, the directors of the latter are unwilling that this should be done. If the merger is to go through it seems to me it will require the intervention of some third party who will be able to get both banks to make certain concessions and after doing so to decide on a basis that will be satisfactory to both. So far we have not met any such party."

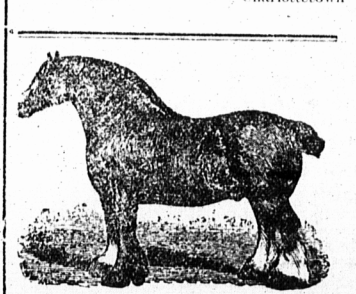
