THE CITIZENS' MEETING

The Non Enforcement of the Scott Act Causes a Lively Discussion and the Meeting Ends Abruptly.

The Civic Meeting last night was a well attended and representative one, most of the leading citizens and rate payers being present.

Mayor Campbell read the financial statement which has already appeared in THE GUARDIAN.

After the Chairman's remarks there was silence for a space of 10 or 15 minutes when a little sparring between Mr. Allan McKinnon and Coun. Kirke took place.

Mr. Geo. E. Baker followed, somewhat severely criticising the manner in which the water tanks had been built and Water Street repaired.

Coun. Brace explained that under former Councils it was customary to have an over draft in the bank on which citizens were obliged to pay interest.

James A. Morrison thought the question whether the C. T. A. had been properly enforced was the most important for this meeting to consider.

D. Montgomery expressed himself as satisfied with the general work of the Council, but was not at all satisfied with the way the C. T. A. was enforced.

Coun. Goss was the next speaker. He referred to the division that had occurred at the beginning of the year tracing the unsatisfactory results to that period.

Coun. Morris thought the criticism of the citizens had not been unkind, altho Mr. Baker had claimed the Councillors knew nothing.

With reference to the C. T. A. the Mayor Mr. McNeill and himself had been blamed which the present Council undertook to run the C. T. A. after election did not commend itself to him.

The present Mayor and Councillors had accepted the nomination of the Temperance League, they were elected to carry out the C. T. A. Looking at the year's work he was sorry to see that there was no improvement over the work of former Councils.

He quoted from the different year books showing the number of convictions, amounts collected for fines; the number of arrests for drunkenness had remained practically the same. When Henderson was here an effort was made to stop the sale of liquor and as far as he could learn the bar rooms were closed.

Henderson was discharged and the same old system was re-established. As one interested in the moral welfare of the Town he was pained to see that we were practically no further ahead than we were one year ago.

Mayor Campbell denied having associated himself with the temperance ticket. He thought the people were making poor use of this machine, the Scott Act. Experience teaches that the Act is unworkable. The means at present being used is a failure.

Mr. John M. Clarke followed. He was the delegate appointed by the Temperance League to interview Mayor Campbell and to ascertain if he would accept nomination on the temperance ticket. Mayor Campbell consented.

R. C. McLeod, while commending the general routine work of the town during the year, thought they had broken faith with the people in the matter of enforcing the Scott act.

He thought Councillor Morris in separating himself from the other temperance Councillors on account of an action of theirs which he did not approve of had acted unpatriotically.

Had the Council stood shoulder to shoulder they would have succeeded in very largely decreasing the liquor business of the Town.
