The steamer St. Pierre-Miquelon was released at North Sydney on Tuesday. She has been under arrest since Dec. 31st, at the suit of the Inverness Railway & Coal Co., on account of the sinking of the steamer Renwick. Bonds to the amount of \$33,000 were furnished by the owners. A counter claim has been entered by the defendants through their solicitors, McKenzie and McMillan, and both cases will be heard at Halifax shortly.—Halifax Ex. (The Renwick was a well known visitor to this port. Captain L. A. Demers, Dominion wreck commissioner, has arrived to hold a formal investigation next Tuesday morning in Halifax.)

Electors of Charlottetown
Ladies and Gentlemen:—
Having been called again by hundreds of my fellow citizens to offer as a candidate for Mayor at the election to be held on Wednesday Feb. 14th, I need not remind you of my past record. Improvements speak louder than words.
It would be unfair on my part to seek your support again without placing before you the platform that I shall endeavour to carry out. I may say it is not my intention to make a personal canvass. The election is by ballot, through this medium I respectfully ask your support. If you think I am worthy of it, cast your vote for me. If I did not act up to your expectations when I last held office, vote against me. The matter is entirely in your hands.

If Returned as Chief Magistrate
FIRST. I shall in every way encourage the establishment of new industries and will appoint five councillors to be designated the Industrial Committee whose duty will be principally to make enquiries, and if necessary take steps to induce men of means to establish works that will give employment to our citizens.
SECOND. My attention will be given to the good work of laying concrete sidewalks and the macadamizing streets, thereby improving our City and employing our working men.
THIRD. From observation and enquiries made while visiting other cities I am convinced that with the co-operation of the Light & Power Company our streets can be much better lighted at no more expense to the City with the exception of a little extra for lamp posts which could be manufactured in one of our City establishments by our own mechanics.
FOURTH. A Provincial Government have placed upon the Citizens very heavy taxes for which we receive very little benefit. I shall make an effort to secure a just and reasonable share of the revenue, and if successful the amount should be expended on permanent improvement.
FIFTH. The general health and sanitary condition of the City will have my careful attention.
SIXTH. In almost all well regulated Cities, hospitals and charitable institutions receive assistance from the public treasurer. In this respect our past City Councils have failed in doing their duty. In order to be in line with other cities I propose cancelling the Mayor's salary and suggest placing the amount on the estimate as follows:—
Tuberculosis Society \$50.00
Poor Fund for coal etc. \$50.00
Ch'town Hospital. \$50.00
P. E. I. Hospital. \$50.00
Mt. Herbert Orphanage \$50.00
St. Dunstan's Orphanage \$50.00
The balance. \$24.44 to be divided in equal parts for prizes between the three public schools, Prince Street, St. Patrick, and West Kent.
These with all other matters pertaining to the welfare of the City will have my special attention.
