**REUNION OF 2ND SIEGE IN MONTREAL**  
Banquet Held in Place Viger Hotel—Affair Most Enjoyable One—P. E. I. Aply Represented

MONTREAL, Feb. 4.—The Banquet of the Montreal veterans of the 2nd Canadian Siege Battery was held Wednesday evening at the Place Viger Hotel; and, although the attendance was disappointingly small in view of the efforts that had been put forth to reach all the available members, the gathering was thoroughly enjoyable in that it brought together once more a number of men who had come in contact with each other seldom or never during the years since the Armistice.

The feature of the evening was the number of impromptu speeches delivered by the veterans present, and the quality of the oratory unaided and unprepared, was such as might be the envy of many of our professional politicians. 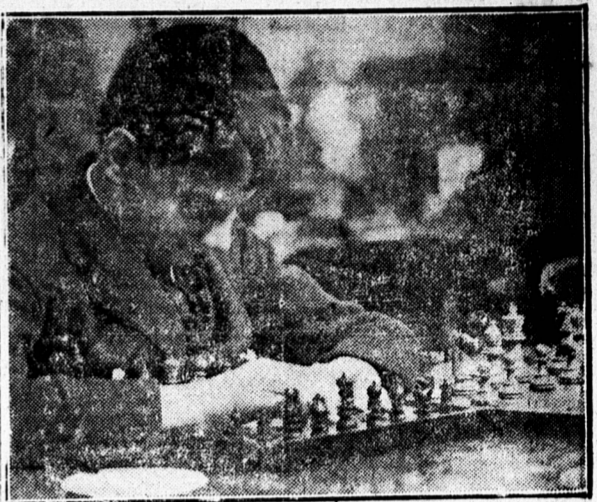
