### Will Decide N.B. N.S. Title This Wk.

### St. Andrews And Second Wolves Will Meet Thursday And Friday In Intermediate Playdowns.

(Canadian Press) ST. ANDREWS, N. B., Feb. 27.—St. Andrew's Senators and Halifax Wolverines will clash here Thursday and Friday in the Maritime intermediate hockey semi-final round, it was announced by the Senators' management tonight following a telephone conference with James A. Wry, of Amherst, President of the M. A. H. A. Senators, finalists for the New Brunswick title last year, captured their elimination round this year and then took the provincial crown by default from Campbellton Tigers. Wolverines were Maritime title holders last year. The winner will meet the Prince Edward Island champions for the Maritime crown.

### Southern Loop Won By Beavers

### Fredericton Eliminated, Losing Deciding Game To Saint John 1-0. Estabrooks Scores Winning Goal

(Canadian Press) SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 27.—Saint John Beavers became champions of the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League tonight by edging out Fredericton Capitals 1-0 in the fourth playoff game. The win gave Saint John two victories against one for Fredericton. Another match ended in a deadlock. Saint John will next meet Bathurst. Steve Estabrooks, left winger, accounted for the vital goal at the 6:30 mark of the second period by shooting in his own high rebound from the wire screen behind the cage. Throughout the game he was by far the outstanding player. Slush and pools of water on the ice were a great handicap. The game was three quarters of an hour late in starting owing to a protest by Fredericton against playing with ice conditions as they were.

### Second Abbies And S'Side Draw

### Intermediate Playdowns Ended 1 All Last Night—Western Team To Play Final Game Here Tonight

(Special to The Guardian) The Summerside Hockey Club and Chick Williams' second Abbies fought to a one all draw in the first of their home and home series for the Island intermediate championship at Crystal Rink, Summerside, last night. The brand of hockey displayed was not up to the standard of recent games played here and at times was rather ragged. The Hockey Club players had the first two periods, but fell down badly in the last session which was decidedly in favor of the Charlottetown men, although it went scoreless. The teams meet this evening at Charlottetown for the deciding game and each team has about even chances. The first period was somewhat listless, till the ten minute mark when Schurman, Steele and Montgomery came on the forward line. Schurman's famous poke check kept the second Abbie forwards at centre ice and at thirteen minutes, Steele realized on a pass from one of these poke checks for the first counter. In this period the Charlottetown forwards made few close in attacks and seemed to be content with long shots at the net. The second period was more lively and both Schurman and McEwen had some strenuous net minding to do. One minute before the bell, Currie caught the Summerside defence napping and went in close to beat Schurman and even the score. The final stanza went scoreless, with the Charlottetown men leading the play for most of the period.

## Abegweits Lose Tough Battle 3-2

### 19 Penalties Handed Out When Wolves Nose Red Shirts In Thrilling Game—Walter Lawlor Suffers Broken Collarbone.

(Canadian Press) HALIFAX, Feb. 27.—Halifax Wolverines, away to a rolling start in their goal-getting race with Charlottetown for the right to meet Moncton in the Maritime Hockey League final, tonight picked up speed as they handed the Abegweits a 3-2 trimming and resumed their six goal lead in the four game total goal series. With only one game left to play, the Abegweits faced the virtually impossible task of overcoming an 11-5 lead if they are to survive.

### "Almost Too Wide"

Wide open hockey — almost too wide at times — was the order of the night, and for a time it looked as though the visiting Islanders might cut down still further the six goal margin the Wolves had rung up in the series' first encounter, and which had been clipped to five on Friday night. After Vince Ferguson had restored the balance for Halifax midway through the first, Hymie McArthur netted one for the Abegweits in the last minute of the session, and toward the end of the second Kane beat Kuhn again, cutting the Wolves' series lead to four goals. But before the middle frame closed, Mickey McGlashen went through to flip one back of Bubar in the Charlottetown cage, and early in the third Owen Lennon added another. Both teams missed many opportunities around the net.

### Lawlor Injured

Near the close of the game, Walter Lawlor, homebred Charlottetown forward, went out of the game for the season with a broken collarbone as he attempted to crash through the Graham-Lavigne defence.

### McGlashen Had Big Night

Mickey McGlashen had a big night offensively for the Wolves, but shared the general tendency to miss open nets. The Halifax squad had the margin of play throughout. The Abegweits forwards worked hard and doggedly, but Lavigne and Graham were working with precision on the Halifax rearguard.

### Close Shaves

Wild passing by Halifax players nearly proved costly in early moments of the game. Beaton and Kane were in dangerously close on several occasions, but Lavigne relieved with a sensational end to end rush and forced Bubar to a brilliant save. Beazley also worked in on the Charlottetown net but his pass went uncollected. Penalties to Abegweits paved the way for the first Halifax goal, Beazley giving the puck to Ferguson in the centre ice zone. The lanky left winger went in close to pick a corner of the net. With Hudson back on the ice the Islanders went on the offensive, McArthur getting the equalizer.
