He foresees that industries, such as the above named, are bound to be established in the Province and sees that Kensington has all the requisites that are needed to foster increased production and to finish the product.

### Town of Kensington

The annual public meeting of the citizens of the Town of Kensington was held in the Town Hall there on Tuesday, January 20th. Mayor Bentley presided. All the Councillors and committees were present and enthusiastic good will prevailed. His Worship delivered the following introductory address:

MAYOR'S ADDRESS  
Members of the Town Council and Gentlemen:

On the close of another year I greet you. I feel we have much to be thankful for in the past year, our country has been cleared from the din of war, no more are our valiant men called upon to stand before the German guns in defence of our country, and we can truly say that we are proud of their gallant deeds. Some of our beloved citizens have paid the supreme price for our freedom.

I would also be mindful of those among us who came back with the scars of battle upon them, and wish to remind you of the duty we owe them. For who but they have saved our country from an autocracy we cannot well imagine, much less describe, and Divine Providence we are able to stand as free men. May we be ever faithful to that trust, keep up before us the principles of Him who went about doing good.

The work of our Town has been carried on to the best ability of those to whom you have entrusted the work, and I feel we can truly say we have done our duty.

The financial statement is before you and I am sure you will feel that it reflects credit upon the whole Council when you take into consideration the fact that, in spite of increased cost of material and labor, there was laid down over three thousand feet of concrete sidewalk and the rate of taxation not increased to any appreciable extent, it being less than three quarters of one per cent.

The department of finance under leadership of our worthy citizen, Dr. Lockhart was well looked after, and I hope to see the Doctor in command for many successful years.

Coun. Simpson who engineered the street department worked as well as probably could be expected considering the fact that he is such a busy man, and the streets are in very fair condition.

I would like to make special mention of the work done by Councillor Champion who so ably managed the sidewalk committee, and with untiring efforts stood by his job till the last gun was fired.

Councillor Gass had many hard battles over the Electric Lights during the past year, of which committee he is in charge, and we all know how unfairly we were treated by the Electric Light Co., without my bringing it up, but not without protest from Councillor Gass, and we hope next year will see the fruits of his labors.

The Police and Property department was well directed by the veteran of our Board, Councillor Donahoe, and I may say that, with such a man as our chief of Police, Mr. H. R. Moose in control, the safety of our Town is assured, and

order has been well maintained throughout the year.

Councillor Warren of the Fire Department had very little to do this year, as there was only one fire and we earnestly hope that we will continue to give the Chairman of that department even less to do as far as fires are concerned.

The Fire Chief, Mr. W. Warren was very faithful to his duties during the year. The Chemical Engine purchased over a year ago, was tried and found wanting, the Company from whom it was purchased not being able to have it approved and labelled by the Laboratories after considerable "red tape" was managed to get it off our hands, and it has been returned to the Company and another one purchased to take its place, that we hope will prove entirely satisfactory.

The coming year will bring its new difficulties and responsibilities that will have to be met by the new Mayor and Councillors, and I bespeak the kindly sympathy that you have shown to me throughout the past year. Your criticism has been considerate and reasonable, and I assure you, it has been a great help to feel that you have at all times been behind me in any movement for the betterment of the Town and Community.

Our worthy Town Clerk, Mr. J. F. Proffitt, has done his work well and in dealing out Justice as our Chief Magistrate, he has been conscientious and fair in all his decisions.

There are many other matters that I would like to deal with, but they will be brought up by others and I will discuss them later as opportunity affords.
