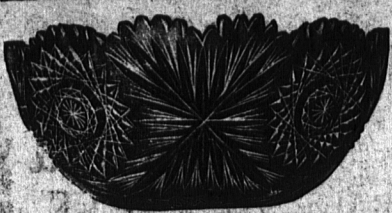

REV. JOHN HARDY of Pala, Koda, India, who is having a furlough in the Maritime Provinces is at present on the island. Mr. Hardy will speak on some phases of his work in the Baptist School-room this evening at 8 o'clock.

REV. W. MCCONNELL, the retiring pastor of the Central Methodist church, who leaves Montreal for St. John to spend a few days prior to going to Fredericton, where he is stationed this year, was presented by his congregation with a purse of \$100.

THE regular monthly meeting of the School Board was held last evening. The teachers' report showed the enrolment for the past month to be 1221, 721 boys, 500 girls, the actual attendance 1137, average attendance 902, per centage 90, number of cases of tardiness 194, truants 5; visits to parents 120; corporal punishment.

NOTICES of the re-appointments of Judge Blanchard and Mr. Handrham, by the government and City Council, respectively, were read, also a number of applications from teachers for positions on the city staff. Tenders for the supply of coal for the City Schools were opened, that of Mr. Dawn's being the lowest, was accepted, also that of Mr. Burke for hauling to West Kent School. A communication re Prince St. School grounds was ordered to lie on the table. The committee on property reported that a portion of the school grounds in each of the City Schools was set aside and prepared for a school garden. After passing some bills the meeting adjourned.

Livingstone, and he with another lad nine years old was out on a raft off which he fell. Dr. Barnes the cooener at Murray River worked for an hour and a half trying to restore life to the boy but was too late. The body was recovered by a son of David Hawkins. The sad event has aroused widespread sympathy.

ON Sunday June the 17th, at Albion P. E. I. there departed from this life the gentle spirit of Mary Jane Chapman, (widow of the late James B. Creed), in her 74th year. Mrs. Creed survived her husband's death by only five months. In the time of adversity, in the hour of mourning, she was very kind and helpful to all those who knew her. Mrs. Creed was ill for about three months, and was attended by Dr. McIntyre. The funeral service was very largely attended and was conducted by Rev. Mr. Motley, pastor of Christian Church, Montague. Her mortal remains were placed at rest in the Ebenezer grave yard, Sturgeon, P. E. I.
