THE Daily Herald of the 13th inst, published at St. Augustine, Fla., has just come to hand with the following particulars regarding the death of Geo. Howatt, formerly of Crapaud, but late of St. Augustine.—Death has claimed another from the midst of our active and prominent citizens, with but slight warning of his coming. Mr. Geo. Howatt died at his residence on South Charlotte street at 3 o'clock this morning, after an illness of but ten days, during only the last two of which was any indication evident that it might terminate fatally. It was the first illness of his 58 years of life to cause him to cease business even for a day. Mr. Howatt came from Prince Edward Island, Canada, thirteen years ago, engaged in the grocery business in St. Augustine, and has been actively interested in it ever since. He leaves a wife and four daughters to mourn his demise. Mrs. F. W. Kettle, Mrs. H. B. Woodward and Misses May and Hazel, and two sons, Capt. Frank J. Howatt and Lieut. E. W. Howatt. His son, Lieutenant Howatt, is expected to arrive from Havana and Mr. F. W. Kettle, his son-in-law, will return from Tallahassee, in time for the ceremonies. Deceased was one of the most prominent merchants and it is proposed to close many of the largest business houses of the city during the funeral hour in deference to his memory. He was formerly a member of the City Council and leaves a record of unsullied manhood as a legacy to those who bear his name. The Florida Times-Union and Citizen, published at Jacksonville, has the following despatch from St. Augustine, dated the 14th:—The funeral of the late George Howatt took place from the family residence, on South Charlotte street, at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The service was attended by hundreds of friends of the deceased, including the Masons, who turned out nearly seventy-five strong to pay their last respect to their dead brother. The parlor of the house in which the casket rested was literally filled with beautiful floral offerings from loving friends, conspicuous among which was a pillow of choice flowers at the head of the casket with the simple inscription "Father." Sad, if ever, was such a collection of beautiful floral offerings seen at a funeral in this city, showing the high esteem in which the deceased was held. The beautiful Episcopal service was read over the remains by the Rev. C. M. Sturges of Trinity Church, who had been Mr. Howatt's first and dearest friend since he came to Florida, thirteen years ago. At the grave the regular Masonic service was also read. During the hours of the funeral many of the principal establishments of the city were closed out of respect to the dead merchant.
