CONFERENCE CLOSES.

FREDERICTON, June 17--The Methodist conference of New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island closed its session here tonight shortly after 11 o'clock after transacting a large amount of business.

It was decided by resolution that the mission board appoint a successor to Rev. Thos. Marshall as superintendent, he having resigned.

A memorial service was then held for Rev. Joseph Pascoe, of Sackville district, who had passed away since the last conference.

It was decided to hold the next session on the conference at Charlottetown on the second Thursday of June, 1913, at 9 a.m. The conference then adjourned.

At the meeting of the conference on Saturday J. M. Palmer was selected treasurer of the Conference Education Fund, and Rev. J. Heaney secretary.

The following probationers were recommended to attend Mt. Allison College: George N. Sommers, Frederick J. Bertram, Francis H. Littlejohn, Herbert T. Smith, O. H. Peters, Benjamin W. Turner, Christopher Graham, W. Stanley Helps.

The several districts of the conference contributed the sum of \$1,614.38, which is a slight decrease as compared with last year.

The General Epworth League Fund reported the sum of \$50.50 on hand. The Parsonage Aid Fund reported that at the close of the conference year there was a balance on hand of \$500.

This morning Rev. Dr. Harrison reported for the Children's Fund, showing a balance on hand of \$1,160.50. The change was made in the distribution of the fund, making the basis \$900.

The Laymen's Association reported having met and presented a lengthy report. The officers elected are as follows:--J. M. Palmer, president; J. M. Lemont, vice-president; R. Duncan Smith, secretary-treasurer.

Among the matters considered and recommended by this organization was systematic giving and a request that laymen be given a place on the stationing committee. They also recommended a prohibitory liquor law for the province.

Committee on Epworth League also reported. This report showed a membership of 949 and having raised \$1,639.51 for all purposes.

Rev. Dr. Chown came to the conference this morning. He delivered a stirring address on matters social, national and religious. The leading note of the address was one of optimism respecting the future.

The General Conference Fund Committee reported that 747 had been received.

J. B. Gough was reported treasurer of the fund.

Thomas Hicks was appointed secretary-treasurer of the contingent fund and the report on that branch was adopted. The report of the Sunday school fund was also adopted. It showed

satisfactory increase in funds. The following officers for this department were appointed:--Rev. J. B. Gough, chairman; Rev. J. J. Pinkerton, treasurer; Rev. A. D. McCully, secretary; Rev. S. Howard, and J. Hunter White presented the report of the Supernumerary Committee. The report was sent back to the committee. The report of the Sunday school committee was adopted. On motion, the following officials were appointed for the Children's Fund Committee:--Rev. James Crisp, chairman; Rev. George Steele, treasurer.
