**SOLDIERS RECEIVED 4,500,000 LIRE.**

ROME, Jan. 20.—The report of the military post office service for December issued to-day, shows that at the holiday season the Italian soldiers at the front received funds from their families to the amount of 4,500,000 lire and that they sent home savings to the amount of 10,500,000 lire.

LONDON, January 21.—Members of the French and British Governments had another war conference this afternoon in Downing Street. France was represented by Premier Briand, Jules Cambon, general under secretary of the Foreign Ministry, and Alexandre Millerand former Minister of War, for the British Government, Premier Asquith, War Secretary Kitchener, Foreign Secretary Grey and First Lord of the Admiralty Balfour were present. A number of French and British military and Naval officers also attended the meeting. Further plans for active prosecution of the war were discussed.

A few hours before the conference began the Foreign Office issued a statement, discrediting the German report that the Allies have delivered a forty-eight hour ultimatum to Greece. It was stated that German reports of new developments in Greece are "heavily untrue."

Despatches from Rotterdam and from German cities reported a revolutionary republican movement on foot in Greece and King Constantine's Government in danger of falling. From several sources come fresh reports of Allied troops landings, and with them a renewal of the reports that the Austro-German-Bulgarian attack on Saloniki is about to begin.

**WOULD BE ASSASSINS OF JAPANESE PREMIER ARE ARRESTED.**

TOKIO, January 21.—Four young political agitators have been arrested for the recent attempt on the life of Count Okuma, the Japanese premier. The ringleader of the group, Umataro Shimomura confessed that he threw the bombs.

**SWEDEN PROHIBITS EXPORT OF WOOD PULP.**

STOCKHOLM, Sweden January 21.—via London.—A decree prohibiting the exportation of wood pulp goes into effect tomorrow. This order is regarded as a matter of reprisal at Great Britain for the seizure of steamships of parcels post packages destined for Sweden.

**ICE RACES AT NEW LONDON**

The New London Ice Racing Club that made a name last winter for big fields, good racing, and large crowds, set a new mark January 20th, at their first race of the season. The Speed Committee scraped a course that was nearly perfect, and there were between three and four hundred teams on the ice and tied along the shore, the course being land-locked and well sheltered.

In the three-minute class seven answered the bell and they got away on the fourth score, Harry P. assuming the lead which he held until near the wire when Happy Wilkes came on with a rush and won by a comfortable margin, Medium Happy being a good third. Hamilton Boy 4th.

The second heat was a repetition of the first, Happy Wilkes drawing away in the last strides just beating Harry P., but the 3rd heat was a different story as Merry Widow sporting a brand new set of "skirts," came strong at the finish and nipped the heat from Happy, who was leading Harry P.

Merry Widow had the log in the fourth beating both front horses with something to spare, as Toombs behind Happy Wilkes waited too long before making his drive, but in the final he took no chances, taking a lead early in the heat which he kept to the end, Merry Widow second, Harry P. third.

Both Happy Wilkes and Medium Happy, the latter making his first start and showing well, are by Harry George, 2.20 1/4, and both promise to go on.

The second event was a special race, there being only two horses, Ono, owned and driven by Ed. Urch, and Harry Mac, the property of I. Bernard, and they put up a race worth going to see, the full five being necessary to determine the winner. This was Mr. Urch's maiden start as a teamster, but he behaved like a veteran, making well timed finishes, and while Harry Mac was beaten he covered himself with glory, trotting true and fast without making any mistakes.

Robert McLeod, Starter, handled the flag with good judgment. Judges: W. S. Found, J. Archibald Campbell, J. L. Lockhart, B. W. McArthur, Timmer, Hugh Morrison.

**WHEN PEACE IS SIGNED.**

Description of the Treaty That Will End the War.

When the war comes to an end a treaty of peace will be signed, sealed and delivered as between the various belligerents.

This will be a most imposing document, written by hand throughout, sealed with many seals, and bound about with green silk ribbon. Following the usual custom, each copy will begin with the words, "In the Name of the Most Holy and Undivided Trinity." Should, however, Turkey be one of the signatory powers as seems probable, this formula will be altered to "In the Name of Allah the Almighty God" in the copy allotted to her.

At least as many original copies as there are signatory powers will be signed and sealed, while several certified copies will be signed, but not sealed, for the sake of convenience. The original copies will be securely locked up in the state archives of the different countries; the certified copies will be for printing from and for reference.

Peace treaties are not written straight across the page, or pages, like ordinary documents. They are written in parallel columns, one in English, the next in French, the next in Italian, German, Russian, and so on, according to the number of languages spoken by the people of the signatory powers. The text of each of these columns is an exact translation of the text of all the other columns, and the utmost pains is taken in the selection of words that will convey identical shades of meaning.

The monarchs of the signatory powers don't affix their signatures or seals to the peace treaties entered into by "them." This important formality is carried out by specially accredited peace commissioners, each of whom used his own personal private seal, the impression being in red wax.

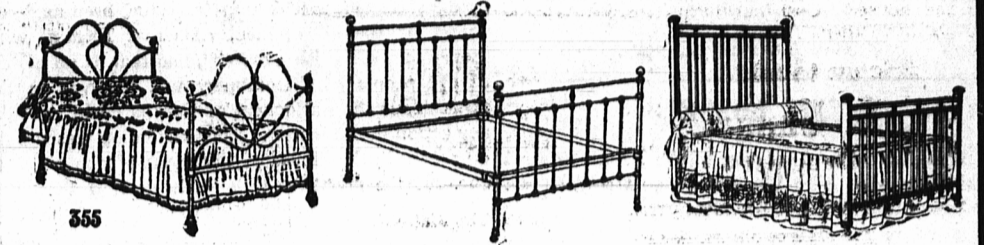
