McGill students and graduates throughout the Province will be glad to learn of the coming reunion of graduates. An exchange says:—Following the success of the McGill medical reunion here it was definitely announced today that a general reunion to embrace all the graduates of all the faculties of McGill would be held in 1913. A general committee is being formed, and thousands of invitations and notices will be sent out. The Canadian Medical Association which has been holding its annual meetings here during the reunion of McGill medical graduates, adjourned today, after visiting the Macdonald Agricultural College, and inspecting the various laboratories and research rooms."

The Halifax Maritime Merchant says—Dry goods travellers are now out with lines for assorting and a few special samples of fall goods. Since the weather has become a bit warmer they have found assorting business much better, though in Prince Edward Island complaints were still being made at the end of last week. One thing that all travellers seem to agree upon is the good condition of the country financially. A dry goods traveller from Prince Edward Island told us a day or two ago that in all the years he had been doing that territory he did not recollect a time when Island merchants were in better shape than they are today, although the backwardness of the spring has shortened their sales of summer goods up to the present time. In the mainland, the season being a little further advanced, trade has shown greater activity and the fact that lumbering operations for the winter were so successful has given merchants in some parts a greater confidence than they would otherwise have had. We should say that taking everything into consideration it looks very much as though we are going to have a good summer's trade in dry goods throughout the provinces and that the main difficulty will be to get supplies promptly owing to the short shipments being made by the mills. Collections have improved somewhat since our last report, but money is not yet as plentiful as jobbers would like it.

PROCEEDINGS OF IMPERIAL CONFERENCE

LONDON, June 6.—The Imperial Conference's delayed report on the conclusion of Friday's proceedings has been made public. Premier Fisher stated that it was advisable in the interest of the United Kingdom and the dominions that the efforts in favor of British manufactured goods and shipping be supported as far as practicable.

Mr. Pearce said the principal difficulty was with regard to certain treaties, which were in the main with the dominions. The dominions by legislation desired to assist British shipping the United Kingdom might very well consider the advisability of denouncing the provisions which stood in the way of such action.

Mr. Buxton said the matter had to be considered in connection with British shipping all the world over. The denunciation of parts of certain treaties might be undertaken if the end justified the means.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier said the treaties they had to deal with were in existence long before the dominions reached their present position, and were negotiated from the viewpoint of Great Britain alone. In recent years the home government had adopted the principle of not including the self-governing dominions in commercial treaties without first obtaining their consent. With a view of the matter being considered, he would at a subsequent meeting move that the home government be requested to open negotiations with several foreign governments having treaties which apply to the dominions, with a view to securing the liberty of the dominions which may not be withdrawn from a treaty without impairing the treaty in respect to the rest of the empire.

Premier Fisher of Australia, moved that it was desirable that the attention of the government of the United Kingdom and the colonies be called to the state of the navigation laws in the Empire and other countries. Mr. Buxton said the government would accept the resolution, provided it read "that it is desirable that the attention of the governments of the United Kingdom and the dominions should be called to the desirability of taking effectual steps to secure uniformity in the treatment of British shipping to prevent unfair competition by foreign subsidized ships, and secure for British ships equal trading advantages with foreign ships. This would promote the employment of British seamen on British ships, raise their status and improve their conditions."

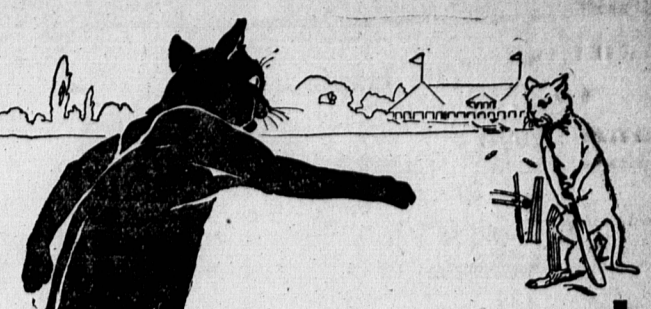
