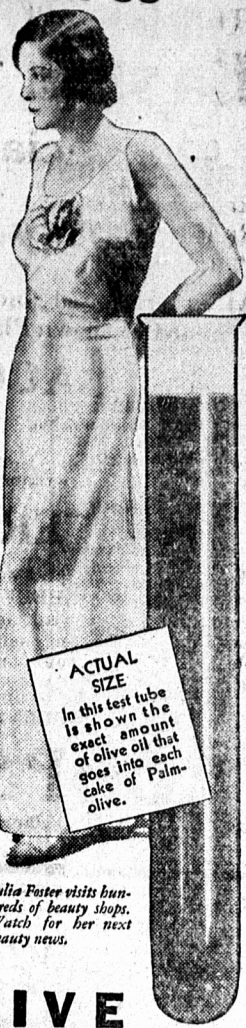

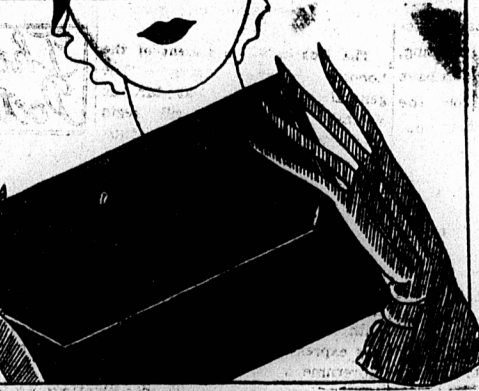

The Montreal Civic Elections

MONTREAL, Que., March 22—(By The Canadian Press)—After keeping his own counsel while other candidates were beginning their campaigns, Camille Houde today filed papers and declared his intention of contesting to succeed himself as Mayor of Montreal.

Today was nomination day and on April 4 the electors will go to the polls. Four candidates for the mayoralty presented themselves while 89 were in the field for the 35 aldermanic seats. One alderman, Joseph Schubert, of St. Louis Ward, secured an acclamation, through delay by A. Rosenberg, his prospective opponent, to take his papers to the City Clerk before the clock struck twelve. Alderman Dupre in Mercer Ward has a possible chance of being granted an acclamation by the courts as the City Clerk announced that when his opponent, Leonce April, filed his papers a formal protest was lodged on the ground that he did not have the necessary residence qualification.

Mayor Houde's opponent were Fernand Rinfret, member of Parliament and former Secretary of State, Seraphim Ouimet, civil engineer and O. L. Gingras. It is the first essay into the public field of Messrs Ouimet and Gingras.
