This was substantiated subsequently during the day by the several companies posting advance minimum price of about \$1.00 per ton increase.

Livestock Market

MONTREAL, Que., Dec. 3.—There were 50 cattle and 204 hogs for sale on the two Montreal livestock markets today. Yesterday's market was completely cleared up during the day, except one load of steers held over from Monday's market.

Cattle offered today were only common cows, canners, cutters and bulls and were sold at about steady prices. Common bulls brought from \$3 for light yearlings to \$4 for heavy flashy bulls. There were no calves or sheep for sale.

Hogs were about steady at \$10 for bacon and butchers with \$1 premium per hog on selects. Sows were sold around \$9.
